

# St Peter's Rectory Advent 2013

My dear friends,

Much to the despair of people who struggle with Christmas being celebrated earlier and earlier each year, I've already begun playing Christmas music in the Rectory. I acknowledge that it is desperately wrong of me to do so (liturgically speaking) but I just cannot contain my festive mood at this time of year! Yet I recognise that for many people, the thought of Christmas brings with it a sense of dread. Some people will struggle with making ends meet, buying gifts on credit, and perhaps even having to choose between paying the utility bills or purchasing presents. Some people will feel increasingly isolated and lonely, as they see the world around talking about family and friends getting together, whilst they prepare to endure an agonising day on their own. Some people will be facing a Christmas Day without a loved one for the first time, and it will be a day of sadness and  $\overline{\mathbb{N}}$ mourning for them.

But the birth of Jesus can bring us hope.

If we truly appreciated the real meaning of Christmas, then we wouldn't get so hung up on buying the latest 

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fads; we would reach out to neighbours and strangers around us, and ensure that nobody was alone on Christmas day; we would have peace and hope even in the midst of grief, knowing that because of Jesus, our loved ones who have died have entered into the presence of our kind and merciful God.

Christmas therefore presents us with a real challenge. Not the challenge of trying to stay in a good mood whilst navigating through crowds of slow walkers when you're in a hurry, or queuing endlessly, or resisting the temptation to eat too much. The real challenge is to focus on Jesus: not just remembering his birth, but asking ourselves what his birth means for us today. How does it affect us? How does it change our behaviour and our attitude?

The challenge is to make Christmas a time for behaving like Christ, and considering who needs practical help, who needs forgiveness, who needs mercy, and who needs a friend? This is a time for us to pledge ourselves to answering those questions with actions, always in the name of Jesus.

May you have a very peaceful Advent, Christmas and New Year!

# **RECTOR'S NOTES**

### WORSHIP IN ADVENT AND CHRISTMAS

As well as our regular services, we will also have a short service of Compline each Wednesday evening in Advent (4<sup>th</sup>, 11<sup>th</sup>, 18<sup>th</sup> December) at 7:30pm. Each will last around twenty-five minutes, enabling Choir Practice to begin as usual at 8pm.

On Sunday 1<sup>st</sup> December we will have our Advent Carol Service at 6:30pm, and on Sunday 22<sup>nd</sup> December we will have the traditional Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols.

On Christmas Eve at 3pm there will be a short get together for children and their parents and wider family. This is being organised by our Sunday School teachers and will focus upon retelling the Nativity story.

Later that night at 11pm will be our service of "Midnight Communion" as we begin our main celebration of Jesus' birth. On the following morning, Christmas Day, there will be a service of Holy Communion at 9am, followed by a Service of the Word at 11am. This latter service will be a more relaxed Christmas Celebration aimed at all ages.

## PARISH GROWTH

Nothing strikes fear into more people's hearts than the word "change"! Yet change is not only inevitable but also very necessary. For in the two thousand years that the Christian Church has existed, it has had to adapt with each successive generation to new cultures, new social needs, and new technology. As no two congregations are the same, these changes have not been uniform throughout the world, nor even within our own denomination. The Church of Ireland is a diverse community, representing a wide spectrum of

churchmanship, beliefs, customs and emphases precisely because each parish has adapted in a different way from its neighbours. However, although each parish community is unique, we are all called by God to be worshipping, learning, welcoming, active, helpful, evangelising, and obedient communities of Christians.

The time has now come for us as a parish to consider how we fulfil our vocation as a Christian Church. I am therefore initiating a Parish Vision Strategy, in order to bring new life to St Peter and St James. Naturally this will take a lot of planning, time, effort, and money. And yet if we are to be true to our calling as part of the Christian Church, then we must accept the challenge of revitalising every aspect of our worship, ministry and mission.

In this regard, it is my role as Rector always to point in the direction of God, rather than to impose my own ideas upon the parish. As such, I intend to lead us in a conversation, with God, and each other, through which we will begin to articulate God's own vision for this parish. This will not necessarily be an easy process, for there will of course be disagreements along the way, and there will be a lot of soul-searching as we seek to discern what we are doing right and what we must be prepared to change. There will be tough decisions, and there will be a challenge to step out of our comfort zone.

Over the next few years, we must ask ourselves three key questions:

- 1. What makes us unique as a church?
- 2. What is our God-given purpose?
- 3. What are the needs in our local community?

When we have reflected upon the questions above, and given honest answers, we will then be in a position to see a broad vision of opportunities, and also a huge range of possible changes and innovations which, if implemented, would bring our parish into line with the will of God.

None of this should give anyone cause for concern, for this is not about throwing out over a century of tradition; rather it is about continuing to do what we do best in worship, whilst at the same time broadening our activities and reaching out to the local community.

There will be more reports through these Parish Notes as time goes on, outlining how the Parish Vision Strategy is taking shape. Throughout all of this, we must constantly pray for wisdom, courage and strength from God. Jesus Christ is the Lord of our parish of St Peter and St James, and our focus must always be upon him.

#### **BOWLING CLUB**

Being a Rector brings with it a whole host of responsibilities that you might not expect, and in this parish is means being the President of the Bowling Club! So far all that this has entailed has been the honour of throwing the first bowl at the start of the season. I'm certain that there is a much more technical word for this than "throwing" but that word adequately expresses my (lack of) technique. I'm sure the bowlers won't mind me admitting that I was surprised at how much I enjoyed the experience! Having reached the half-way mark to



seventy years of age, I'm not as energetic as I used to be, and I found bowling to be both relaxed and relaxing, despite requiring quite a high degree of skill. All my wasted years of ten-pin bowling did not prepare me for the nuanced delivery of the bowls and the team effort required. They regularly give yorkies (the chocolate, not the dogs) as prizes. Needless to say I've won nothing so far. But it is good fun and I heartily recommend it to parishioners – young and old – who want a bit of craic whilst giving an outlet to their competitive spirit.

The Club meets on Tuesday evenings from 7.15pm till 10pm, and members are always happy to see new people coming along. Why not give it a go?!

### **CHURCH OF IRELAND CENSUS**

During the previous month, every parish in the Church of Ireland was asked to collect statistics concerning the genderdivide and age-range of their congregations. This was done by asking every person who entered our churches on three Sundays in November to fill out a very rudimentary survey.

Let me give a broad outline of the information collected:

- 3<sup>rd</sup> November 81 worshippers (36 men and 45 women)
- 10<sup>th</sup> November 100 worshippers\*
- 17<sup>th</sup> November 66 worshippers (27 men and 39 women)
- 24<sup>th</sup> November 82 worshippers (32 men and 49 women)

On all of the above dates, around 85% of the congregation were in their mid-forties or older. (\*No specific data was collected for Remembrance Sunday). All of the data has been sent to Church of Ireland House, and will be collated in order to present an accurate picture of how we are doing, both as an individual parish, and also as an entire denomination. It is expected that this survey will be repeated in three years time.

## **ORGANISTS**

I would like to thank Mr Stephen Hamill for many years of service as Organist and Choir Master in St Peter's. Since 2002, he has developed the music in St Peter's to an exceptional standard, initiating the Carol Service in Advent, and the Tenebrae Service in Holy Week. As a professional organ builder, Stephen has also enhanced the organ in St Peter's so that it is now a four-manual pipe/electric hybrid. I am certain that I speak for all of us when I thank him for all he has done in and for our parish, and wish him every blessing for the future.

In relation to this, we are currently advertising the position of Organist and Choir Master. The closing date is Monday 9<sup>th</sup> December, and more information about the job can be found on our parish website. I am pleased to say that already we have had several serious expressions of interest, and - God willing - we should have someone appointed in January. In the meantime we are reliant upon the assistance of a few individuals who have helped us to ensure that we have music to sing along to in our services!

*Col Frank Hewitt* is a friend of mine from my previous parish, who has served in the past as the Assistant Organist in Ballymena. Much to his credit, he was very quick to agree to help us, despite a sixty mile round trip!

*Mr Julian Moller* should be known to many in the parish, not only for his own expertise as an organist, but also as the son of a former Curate of St Peter's, the Very Rev'd Brian Moller. It's great to keep these connections going.

Dr Desmond Hunter, who was the Organist and Choir Master in St Peter's some twenty years ago, has very kindly volunteered to help as much as he can. As a result he is not only playing regularly at our services but is also conducting weekly choir practices which will also ensure that we will have our traditional service of Nine Lessons and Carols. He is also advising us throughout the recruitment process for a new Organist.

To these three gentlemen may I express my genuine gratitude. We truly have been blessed by God through their ability and willingness to help.

### **FINANCES**

Every parishioner should have received a letter alongside their Parish Notes, outlining the financial difficulties being faced by the parish, and urging them to consider their own free will offering to Church funds. I thank David Nairn (our Honorary Treasurer), David Cromie, Noel Beattie (our FWO Secretary), Stanley McDowell and Ernie Stewart for steering this process and producing a plethora of facts and figures.

I understand fully that money is tight for everyone, and certainly it is not the intention of the Select Vestry to place a heavy financial burden on anyone. What we are hoping for is that you will give generously and gladly to God's work in proportion to your income. This means making your financial contribution to the Church a significant part of your Christian discipleship, through which you are giving something back to God in return for all the blessings that he has poured out on you: life, love, friends, family, home, and happiness.

In addition to this increase in our free will offering, the Select Vestry has also been charged with finding new ways of increasing our parish income, and also cutting back on unnecessary spending. Over the coming months (and years!) more about this will be mentioned in the Parish Notes, including various social events and other fundraising activities.
