

RECTOR'S NOTES

AN EARRING FOR A LIFE?

Over the last year, the Select Vestry has been deliberating purchasing a defibrillator for use in the church and halls. Many churches and community organisations now have them, as every second counts when someone has a heart attack. There are of course practical considerations: where should it be located so that it is readily available when it is needed, and yet not easily vandalised or misused? Who should be responsible for using it, and what training do they need? Although we need to work out the details, we are all in general agreement about the necessity of having one. The cost will be around f_1000 , and one excellent suggestion has been to collect any gold that parishioners might have, and trade it in for cash. Now, I'm sure most parishioners don't have bars of gold lining their living room walls, but very often there might be gold earrings or gold necklaces, or indeed many other small items, that are simply existing in a corner of a jewellery box, that we might consider parting with. They don't have to be in perfect condition, and a single earring is just as worthy of donation as a pair. Such a collection has been done in other parishes, and it has proven to be a useful fundraiser for a one-off project. So please have a look and see if there is anything you would like to donate, no matter how small. With a defibrillator bought for our church, your little broken gold earring might help save someone's life. Maybe even your own. Please bring any gold to a church service, and give it to myself or one of the Churchwardens over the next month.

SERMON SUMMARIES

On the **Second Sunday before Lent** (19th February) we read how St Paul described creation as "suffering", "subject to futility", and "in bondage to decay". And yet that reading, from St Paul's Letter to the Romans, was coupled with an Old Testament passage from the Book of Genesis in which we read that God made the world, and "saw that it was good". What happened that caused this good creation to become so corrupt? The answer, given metaphorically in Genesis, is the temptation of Eve, whereby she made a decision to act against God's wishes, and then took a bite of the forbidden fruit. The ensuing expulsion from the Garden of Eden represents the end of the perfect, blissful, good world that God had intended for us, and the beginning of the corrupt and broken world in which we live. Every day, each of us will experience symptoms of that suffering, futility, and decay, from small irritations and annoyances, right up to major dilemmas and trauma. We therefore need to recognise this theological truth—that the world is broken and that we are broken within it—which is presented to us from the very outset of Holy Scripture. But we also need to recognise that—as declared throughout the rest of the Bible—that if the world is broken, then it needs someone to fix it. That "someone" is of course Jesus Christ. Through Christ, God himself came into the world 2000 years ago, and he suffered every imaginable form of trouble that this corrupt world could throw at him. He suffered, and yet he forgave. He was mocked, and yet he did not retaliate. He was murdered, and yet he was raised from death. Through experiencing the corruption of the world, and yet not being corrupted by it, Jesus Christ overcame its power. And

through the outpouring of the Holy Spirit, he gives each of us his power to begin the process of overcoming the corruption within both ourselves and the world around us.

On the **Third Sunday before Lent** (12th February) I told you about how—for the first time in 20 years—one of my car tyres exploded whilst I was driving. I then found it impossible to take off that type and replace it with a spare. I tried, a friend tried, my dad tried, but none of us could do it. So I had to drive very slowly and very carefully down the road, to reach a car mechanic who could do the job for me. And then when I got there, he told me that I needed not just one replacement tyre, but all four! So it was a costly and potentially dangerous situation. What made it worse, was that for a few weeks prior to the tyre exploding, I had thought the car seemed a little bit off. I had recognised that something wasn't right, but I hadn't been motivated enough to check and do something about it. The moral of the story is that when we notice the warning signs that something is wrong—whether with our car or in any other part of our lives—we should deal with it immediately, rather than allowing it to carry on until the point where it explodes without any warning. I had mentioned this because in our Gospel reading, Jesus refers to three particular serious matters: murder, adultery, and divorce. And yet he warns us that these are just the end-point of our sinfulness, and that the sin itself begins long before, even with a mere thought. So, for example, he teaches us that even to be angry with someone is as sinful as it is to murder someone. One is, of course, more extreme than the other, but nevertheless they are linked. Therefore we should watch out for the warning signs that we are getting angry, and do something about it, before our anger grows out of all proportion, and turns

into murder. So, we need to recognise the early indicators of our sinfulness within us, and nip it in the bud from the very outset.

PARISH ELECTIONS

In early April, our registered members will be asked to vote for—or even be nominated for election as—our parochial officers and representatives for the year ahead. The term in office is normally from one Easter to the next, although some of the positions available will have a three-year term. During March, I would like you to give serious consideration to your own participation in these elections. Think about who you want making decisions about this parish on your behalf. And more than that, I want to encourage you to put your own name forward. Let me outline what the positions are: The two **Churchwardens** are responsible for ensuring that the church is open and set-up for worship, and that order is maintained in the congregation during services. They are assisted by the Sacristans and the Sidespersons. They are exofficio members of the Select Vestry and the Events & Organisations Committee. They must be prepared to come to St Peter's most Sundays throughout the year. The two individuals need to be kind, friendly, outgoing, and practically-minded.

The four **Sidespersons** are the assistants to the Churchwardens, helping them whenever necessary, and deputising for them when they are absent. They should be frequent worshippers in St Peter's, and able to arrive early at the church if necessary.

The two **Glebewardens** are responsible for overseeing the maintenance and development of the premises owned by the parish, including the church, the halls, the grounds, and the rectory. They liaise with builders, electricians, plumbers, and carry out basic DIY repairs. They are ex-officio members of the Select Vestry and the Fabric & Furnishings Committee. These two individuals don't necessarily have to climb ladders and paint walls themselves, but they do need to care about the state of our buildings.

The **Parochial Nominators** represent the parish when searching for a new rector in the event that a vacancy should arise. The Supplemental Parochial Nominators are their deputies. These appointments are for three years. These individuals need to be people that you trust to appoint a rector that you would be happy with. They therefore need to be representative of the congregation, and reflective of their spirituality and churchmanship.

The Select Vestry consists of myself, the two Churchwardens, the two Glebewardens, and twelve representatives elected at the Easter Vestry. The Select Vestry is responsible for managing the human, physical, and financial resources of the parish. It meets on the second Monday evening of each month. As the Select Vestry has control of our money, you need to elect people who will not be wasteful, but who will also do their best to resource the Christian ministries of the parish. They therefore need to be sensible, conscientious, and able to work within the Christian ethos and structures of the Church of Ireland.

The Finance & Administration Committee consists of myself, the Honorary Secretary and Honorary Treasurer (both of whom are appointed by the Select Vestry), and three representatives elected at the Easter Vestry. This committee meets on the first Monday evening of each month, and is responsible for matters relating to money, the law, and human resources.

The Fabric & Furnishings Committee consists of myself, the two Glebewardens, and three representatives elected at the Easter Vestry. This committee meets on the penultimate Wednesday morning of each month, and is responsible for matters relating to the repair and development of our buildings. The term "fabric & furnishings" is an old fashioned way of referring to the building and its contents. There is no needlework on this committee! It would be more apt to call it the "Buildings and Grounds Committee" but as a traditionally-minded parish, we use the old name. The Events & Organisations Committee consists of myself, the two Churchwardens, and three representatives elected at the Easter Vestry. This committee meets on the last Tuesday afternoon of each month, and is responsible for matters relating to the use and management of our premises. To avoid any confusion, let me explain that this committee does not manage social events that are organised by parishioners. Whilst it does develop and implement the policies of the Select Vestry in relation to ongoing and oneoff events, the actual management of those events is the responsibility of the people who are organising them, who are subject to any general or specific guidance that the committee might give them.

The **Diocesan Synod** is an annual meeting of the Bishop with the clergy and representatives of the laity. Three members of our congregation represent St Peter's, of whom one must be aged under 44 years. The Supplemental members of the Diocesan Synod are their deputies. These appointments are for three years.

SERVICES IN MARCH

The very first day in March is also, quite coincidentally, the first day of the penitential season of **Lent**, when we focus on the sinfulness of humanity, the suffering and death of our Lord Jesus. Throughout the month our services of Holy Communion will change slightly in order to reflect that change of focus. So, for example, the Gloria in Excelsis will be omitted, and the Prayer of Humble Access will be replaced by the Exhortation.

The season of Lent begins with **Ash Wednesday** on 1st March, and in addition to our regular mid-week celebration of Holy Communion at 10.30am, we will also have a special Penitential Service at 7.30pm.

St Patrick's Day falls on 17th March, but as he is our patron saint, we will instead commemorate his life and ministry at our services on Sunday 19th March. That date, officially, is the feast day of **St Joseph of Nazareth**, so we will transfer his commemoration to our mid-week service at 10.30am on Wednesday 22nd March.

The fourth Sunday in this season is always Mothering Sunday (a church celebration) and also Mothers' Day (a secular celebration). The day before Mothering Sunday this year is the feast day of the Annunciation to the Blessed Virgin Mary, in which we celebrate the angel Gabriel's visit to Mary, to announce the conception of Christ. As the readings for that day are pertinent to motherhood, we will celebrate the **Annunciation** and **Mothering Sunday** together on Sunday 26th March.

The Select Vestry recently took stock of the rate of growth in the parish, in terms of both our income and the size of our congregation. The Select Vestry would like to thank Kathryn Martin and everyone who helped her to make that event successful. During this coming month, a Table Quiz has been arranged for the 31st March, and we hope that you will support it. Remember that in addition to supporting the ministries and mission of the parish, some of the money raised also goes towards supporting the six charities which we voted for last Easter. New ideas for events are always welcomed by the Select Vestry, and nobody should hesitate to put their ideas forward to the Events Committee. We need people willing to organise events which encourage new people into our community, or which enable our existing members to get to know each other better, or which help to raise funds for the parish.

An important part of our broader community outreach is the youth organisations. Unfortunately, these organisations continue to struggle to look for new leaders. To help them maintain their presence here at St Peter's, I would encourage anyone with an interest, to get in touch with one of them and offer to help out. Contact details are on the back of these Parish Notes.

As always, keeping our premises in good condition is a never-ending task: the shutter in the main hall has been fixed; we are currently examining what can be done to improve the heating in the halls; the new kitchen boiler has also experienced some teething problems, and repairs are in hand. The Rector and Glebewardens have also been involved in repair work down in St James, which we still own and manage, but which is used by several other church groups.

On a final note, I would like to encourage all registered members to consider standing for elections to the various positions at the next General Vestry meeting on Sunday 2nd April. If you feel a calling to any role, then don't hesitate to put your name forward, or speak to the Rector for more information.
