RECTOR'S NOTES

CHURCHWARDENS AND SIDESPERSONS

Since Easter you should have noticed some different faces welcoming and assisting the congregation during the 11am services. Each year we appoint or elect two Churchwardens and their four deputies, who are called Sidespersons. Constitutionally their role is "to ensure that, during the time of Divine Service, peace and order are maintained in the church, the church porch and churchyard, and to prevent any disturbance which may hinder the officiating member of the clergy or the congregation." However, long gone are the days when they would use their wands to hit unruly people in the pews! Nowadays they greet people who come to church, hand out Books of Common Prayer and Hymnals, oversee the collection, turn on the heating and lighting, and generally assist the clergy during services.

I served for two years as People's Churchwarden in St Thomas' on the Lisburn Road in south Belfast, and I recall for the first few months feeling totally overwhelmed by the practicalities of it. Observing from the pews, the role looks quite undemanding, but I remember worrying that if I stood in the wrong place, or looked the wrong way, or moved at the wrong time, then the whole world would come to an end. That is the natural reaction of someone who wants to do a job well, especially given that such a role is a real honour.

Here in St Peter's, Daphne McClements was re-appointed as one of the two Churchwardens, but she has now been joined by Ian McManus. Ian has served as Churchwarden in the past, but not for

some time, and as I've made some changes to what happens during services, it will naturally take a few weeks to remember (or learn) what needs to be done. Of the four Sidespersons, Sandra Hutchman and Hilary Shields carried out these duties last year, so they should know what they are doing, but Ashlee McCune and Tom Campbell are coming fresh to the role, and for them it will take some time to settle into way of things. So please be patient with them, pray for them, and whenever possible help Daphne, Ian, Sandra, Hilary, Tom, and Ashlee.

HOLY WEEK

Despite an increasing dearth of Holy Week services in many Church of Ireland parishes, I was very pleased to see a good attendance at each of our own weekday services at such an important time of year. The week culminated with Tenebrae on Good Friday evening, which retold the passion story from St John's Gospel. During the week I felt something of the horror and darkness of the last few days of Jesus' earthly life, and was brought sufficiently spiritually low in order to fully appreciate and celebrate the Resurrection on Easter Day! I hope that the parishioners who came to worship in St Peter's during Holy Week experienced those same feelings of sadness and elation.

On Maundy Thursday and Good Friday there were children's activities organised by Frank our Family Worker, and Paula our Sunday School Superintendent. There were teaching, games and crafts on Thursday, and we thought about "stages of the Cross" on the Friday. From these occasions, and others recently, and I am confident that God is blessing us through our children's ministry. So please keep praying that the children would grow in faith, and pray that we as a parish would have everything we need in order to help their spiritual development.

CHURCH SERVICES IN MAY

We will have our Family Service in the Halls on the second Sunday of the month, which will be led by Frank. As it is Rogation Sunday, the theme will be planting seeds. Please come along and join your children or grandchildren for this service. Whilst they are in the Halls, there will be a service of Morning Prayer in the main church.

There are quite a few special days this month. In addition to Rogation Sunday on the 10th, we celebrate the Ascension on Thursday 14th, then St Matthias on Friday 15th, then Pentecost on Sunday 24th and Trinity Sunday on the 31st. Please do your best to come along to these services. I particularly urge you to worship on Pentecost: alongside Christmas Day and Easter Day, this is one of the three most important days in the Christian calendar.

During the evening of Pentecost there will be a joint service in St Ninian's (on the Whitewell Road, Newtownabbey). That church is due to close at the end of the summer, so it is fitting that parishes from the North Belfast Rural Deanery should come together on this occasion to let God be praised within its walls before closure. There will be a short series of talks given on how God has empowered ordinary people to do extraordinary things, and choirs from the area will work together to lead worship. The Rural Dean in his lack of wisdom has even asked me to preach, but don't let that be a reason to stay away! It should be a lovely and inspiring evening, so please make a special effort to be there.

DAMAGE TO HALL CHAIRS

In recent months at least ten of the red chairs in the halls have been damaged. In some instances there are small holes in the covering of the seats, and in others much of the covering and the underlying foam have been removed. Undoubtedly these acts of vandalism are

being carried out by children (either purposefully or accidentally). However, the responsibility for any damage to our property rests with the adults supervising them. Given the significant number of chairs damaged, we will have to take action against any organisation which permits this vandalism to occur. Could I therefore urge all leaders to keep a watchful eye on children using the seats, and to immediately report the beginnings of any damage that they notice: it would be better to fix a small hole for free, than to have to pay for unreported significant damage. In the first instance, please speak with Anne Cromie in the Parish Office, or if she is unavailable, contact either me or one of the Glebewardens—Victor Davis or Quintin Mulligan.

CHRISTIAN AID

The Archbishop of Canterbury, the Most Rev'd Justin Welby, has sent a letter to all Anglican clergy in Britain and Ireland, reminding us that Christian Aid Week will take place in the second week of May. Let me quote at length from what he has written:

“This year, Christian Aid Week confronts one of the greatest injustices of all times: discrimination against women. The statistics are shocking and Christian Aid’s partners around the world are clear that it needs urgent attention. Half of the world’s population are women and yet they comprise the majority of those living in poverty today. Despite the fact that women do the majority of the world’s agricultural work, less than 20% of landholders globally are women. Around the world, women are paid less than men—in most countries, women earn on average only 60-75% of men’s wages. At every level, from household to the global stage, women are poorer, disadvantaged, more vulnerable. Around the Anglican Communion, churches are responding to God’s call to end oppression and suffering by working to lift women out of poverty and situations of abuse and

injustice... Please join us to pray, act and give for our global neighbours this Christian Aid Week—for a world that looks more like God's kingdom."

I urge you to take heed of the Archbishop's challenge to us, and to help in whatever financial and practical ways you can, in order to help eradicate poverty throughout the world.

TRAINING FOR HALL USERS

Throughout this year we will commence annual training for the leaders of organisations who use our halls. This training will focus primarily on health & safety (including fire safety), and child protection. In the coming weeks and months the leaders will receive an invitation to this training. If this applies to you please do your best to attend. Please note that in some instances attendance is a contractual obligation! Of course we recognise that people are busy, so we will keep the training as short as possible, but we also recognise that this is vitally important for the wellbeing of all people who use our halls.

ROOF REPAIR FUND

At the end of last year, the government announced that it would give a one-off grant to help with urgent roof repairs to listed places of worship. With the closing date on 31st January, we had very little time to apply, so Victor Davis (glebewarden) and I approached Chris McCollum (surveyor) with a view to preparing all necessary information. He told us to apply for £16,000 to repair the roof over the South Aisle (to the right of the building if you are sitting in the church looking towards the front). The floor in that area becomes quite wet whenever the rain is heavy and the wind is blowing in a certain direction.

I am pleased to say that our application has been successful, and that the government will pay most of the funding that we requested. We will now work with Chris McCollum to move this project forward, which will probably mean the removal of the South Aisle roof during the summer months. At this stage I do not know how much of a disruption this will cause us, but hopefully this will be kept to a minimum.

The government has set up a dedicated website at www.ipowroof.org.uk for further information about this grant scheme.

CHURCH'S MINISTRY OF HEALING

When we give money to support the Church, we do so in order to help support the mission, ministries, and worship, of the whole Church, rather than simply paying the bills of this parish. Of course most of our Free Will Offerings will cover our own parochial expenses, but it is entirely right and proper that we should support external organisations which fulfil the mission of the Church on our behalf. To that end, the Select Vestry nominated thirteen charities, of which the General Vestry voted to financially support six this year. The first of those six charities to receive a cheque of £500 is the Church's Ministry of Healing. The Rev'd Dr Pat Mollen joined us for Holy Communion on 19th April, and explained that much of our gift will go towards helping pay the cost of new premises in East Belfast, from where they offer counselling, training, and more simply a place for quiet spiritual reflection. Their work is vitally important in an increasingly secular world which seeks to denigrate Christian healing and spirituality. Their website cmh-themount.org/wp has more information about their various ministries; I urge you to have a look, and even to go up to their new premises and see how they can help you work through the difficulties that we all face in our Christian life.

Ascension Day

The Feast of the Ascension commemorates the bodily ascension of Jesus into heaven. It is universally celebrated throughout the Christian church and ranks in importance with the Passion, Easter, and Pentecost (also celebrated this month). The following account is found in the *Acts of the Apostles*: the apostles asked Jesus, 'Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?' He replied 'It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.' When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. While he was going and they were gazing up towards heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. They said, 'Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up towards heaven? This

Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven.'

Ascension Day is traditionally celebrated on a Thursday, the fortieth day of Easter (Acts 1: 3: After his suffering Jesus presented himself alive to them by many convincing proofs, appearing to them over the course of forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God). This year Ascension Day is on Thursday 14th May. Holy Communion will be celebrated at 7.30pm.

Afraid, alone, in pain

Be the answer to Loko's prayer this Christian Aid Week



Loko's choice in life is simple:
'If I can't collect firewood,
my children will die.'

Four times a week, in a remote corner of Ethiopia, Loko makes a back-breaking eight-hour trip to gather wood. It's a task she dreads, but she steels herself to do it because if she doesn't her children will starve.

She prays to God as she walks. 'I ask him to change my life and lead us out of this,' she says.

Just £5 could give Loko a loan to start her own business buying and selling tea and coffee, freeing her from her desperate task and allowing her to spend more time caring for her family.

This Christian Aid Week, you can help transform lives.

From 10th-16th May, churches the length and breadth of Britain and Ireland will come together to pray, campaign and raise money to improve the lives of people like Loko.
