RECTOR'S NOTES

MONTHLY PRAYER MEETING

The first of our monthly prayer meetings will be held at 2.30pm on Thursday 13th October. It will last for no more than an hour, and like our Bible Studies we will aim to keep it informal. Naturally, some people get anxious about even speaking in front of other people, let alone praying in front of them, but there is no reason at all to worry. At the beginning of the prayer meeting, we will think about what it means to pray with other people, and we will use some very simple techniques to encourage people to be involved. Of course, if you want to come and pray in silence, you will be most welcome to do so. Our focus is on God, not on what anyone else is doing or not doing, and so nobody will be pressured to do or say anything that makes them feel uncomfortable. You can be involved as much or as little as you prefer. The purpose of the prayer meeting is to pray for the needs of the parish, the local community, the world, and for ourselves and those who have requested prayer. I do hope that you can join us.

TEA & COFFEE AFTER CHURCH

The ministry of hospitality is the fancy name that we give to an exceptionally important part of church life, and yet it involves nothing more difficult than making sure that people feel welcome and included within the life of the parish. One of the most obvious expressions of this particular ministry is the tea/coffee which we serve in church every week after the Sunday 9am and Wednesday 10.30am services, and every fortnight after the Sunday 11am service.

We need members of the congregation to volunteer to help with the tea/coffee after the Sunday 11am service. Specifically we need people to volunteer: to set up two tables; to set out the cups; to fills the kettles; to serve the tea/coffee/juice; to remove the tables afterwards; to brush up any biscuit crumbs and to mop up any spillages; to clean up any utensils. You would be doing us all a great service if you volunteered to do even one of those jobs on a regular basis, perhaps even four times a year on a rota. Please speak to me or to Daphne or Sandra, our Churchwardens, so that we can make a list of anyone who is willing to help in any way.

ST JAMES' FURNISHINGS

When St James' was closed as a place of Anglican worship, several of its furnishings were removed from that church. Some of those items were placed directly into St Peter's, whilst others were stored in either the crypt or the rectory garage. Some important

items remained in St James' but were stored away out of sight, because they had no liturgical function for the Orthodox community which worshipped there. Over the last year, I have consolidated items these into furnishings within St Peter's, to the extent that nearly everything in the north side aisle (to the left of the building) and the baptistery are from St James'. For this reason, we have named the north aisle as the St James' Side Chapel, to be used for



non-sacramental services with a small congregation. This is important to me as a successor to the Rectors of St James', that the holy objects that once adorned that fine church building remain in the use of Anglicans who will cherish them. If you know of any former St James' parishioners, please invite and encourage them to join us for worship in St Peter's, and to see once again these beautiful pieces of craftsmanship.

FRANK'S WEDDING

As some of you may know, our Families' Worker, Frank Dillon, is shortly to be married to his fiancée, Bethan Millar. The wedding will be held in early October in Ahoghill Parish, where Bethan's father is the Rector. Please keep Frank and Bethan in your prayers. Pray especially that Frank and Bethan will have no anxiety as the big day approaches, and that the day itself



would be relaxed and enjoyable, and that the rest of their life together would be fulfilling and harmonious.

HOLY LAND PILGRIMAGE

The Rev'd David Humphries, presently Rector of Stormont, but soon to move to Kilbride Parish in this diocese, is organising a pilgrimage to the Holy Land on 29th May – 8th June 2017. This is an annual event, with usually around 20 people from various parishes and denominations heading away to visit Israel. It is an awe-inspiring journey, which will completely change the way you

read the Bible. You will visit many areas of Jerusalem, Bethlehem, the River Jordan where John the Baptist preached, the Dead Sea, the Masada Fortress where the Jews made a valiant last -stand against the Romans, Caesarea Philippae where Jesus called St Peter "the Rock", all the many little villages around the Sea of Galilee, including Capernaum where several of the disciples came lived, and many other fascinating places around Israel. It is really not a holiday; it is a once-in-a-lifetime, life-changing experience. Several people have already signed up on the sheet at the back of the church, indicating that they might be interested. If you would like to go with David's group then please either contact him directly, or else speak with me. He has offered to come and give a talk about the experience to any parishioners who are considering it. Please note that this does happen every year, and so if 2017 does not suit you, then there is always 2018!

SERMON SUMMARIES

On **Sea Sunday** (10th July) I spoke about how the ocean can be a very dangerous place for all who travel on it. Whether as a result of storms, pirates, or accidents, many things can go wrong at sea. When something untoward does happen, people can find themselves bobbing along in the cold water, exposed to the elements, and with a million nasty creatures lurking in the depths below. I then used this as an analogy of how we tend to sail through life. But when something awful happens, we can find ourselves drifting, struggling to keep afloat, and terrified of every possible danger around us. It's at times like that, that our troubles threaten to overwhelm us and drag us under. And yet, there is a lifeboat waiting on the horizon. That lifeboat is the love of God, offered freely and gladly to us though his son, Jesus Christ. It is Jesus who is constantly reaching out to us, offering us his protection from the evils of this world.

On the Sixteenth Sunday after Trinity (11th September) we thought about how the Houses of Parliament in Westminster are in desperate need of refurbishment. The stonework is crumbling, the electrics and plumbing need replaced, and in total the repairs should cost £4 billion, and take around five years to complete. And yet, despite the scale of the problems, there will undoubtedly be some Members of Parliament who would prefer to stay in the building as it is, because the alternative is that they need to find other, less grand, accommodation for those five years. In many ways, this attitude is common to all of us. We prefer the comfort of something imperfect that we know and love, even if there is something better to be gained by a little bit of sacrifice and effort. This is particularly true about our own personalities. We tend to overlook our negative character flaws because we have become so accustomed to them, and they have become a part of our identity. However, as disciples of Jesus Christ, we need to be prepared to undergo a major overhaul of our personality. God wants to refurbish us, and make us fit for purpose as his children. The question is: will we let him change us, or are we more happy to be imperfect because we wrongly think that's all that we can be?

At our **Harvest Thanksgiving** (18th September) I informed the congregation that there was a new word in my vocabulary: "hangry", which is a fusion of "hungry" and "angry". This is the perfect description of anyone who feels irritable and annoyed because they haven't had anything to eat for a while. We then thought of how it is possible to be spiritually hangry. This spiritual hanger is caused when we do not allow God's love to nourish our souls. Without that love, we can feel empty inside, just like having an empty stomach when we have had nothing to eat. When we feel spiritually empty, we end up getting irritable, angry, and bitter, and sometimes we look for all manner of diversions and perversions to make the emptiness go away. But our Lord Jesus told us that he himself is the "bread of life", and that anyone who came to him would never be hungry.

By believing in Jesus, trusting in him, and living as he taught us to live, then he can nourish us, and satisfy the longings of our souls.

HARVEST THANKSGIVING

Some churches hold their Harvest Thanksgiving on a particular Sunday, year after year, and often this is done in order to fit in with their other local churches. However, I think it is more appropriate to keep the date as close as possible to the Harvest full moon, which is when it would have been celebrated in olden days. This means that, like this year, the next few Harvest Thanksgivings will fall in the month of September. One parishioner remarked to me that this is a good thing as there are more summer flowers available, and the weather is more likely to be sunnier, than if we were to leave it until later in the year.



Once again the church was beautifully decorated. A new and very welcome addition were the large sunflowers which adorned the pulpit and the entrance to the nave! Thank you to all who donated flowers, fruit, vegetables, and food items, which we are not just for decoration, but which will be given to the Welcome Centre for the homeless. I would particularly like to thank the children and their Sunday School teachers for decorating their own little corner of the church, and for bringing up an offering of our first fruits during the opening hymn.

PARISH CHOIR

It is wonderful to see our choir stalls so full on a Sunday! For a suburban parish church like St Peter's, it is a significant achievement to have 18 adult choristers. Their God-given musical gifts are a tremendous aid and encouragement to the congregation, and I want to express our immense gratitude to Anne C., Anne S., Annette, Barbara, Clodagh, Ernie, Gareth, Glenn, Hilary, Jill, Mark, Noel, Peggy, Quintin, Rebecca, Rosemary H., Rosemary J., and Sandra. Two of these members have joined in recent months. We heartily welcome Glenn Tweedie, and we are so pleased to see the return of Mark Woods. Even a few extra voices make such a positive difference, and I thank God that he is inspiring people to find a new home in our choir.



Last, but certainly not least, I am grateful to Robert Thompson, for his excellence as both an organist and as a choir master. He is certainly one of the most important reasons for the survival and growth of our choir, and we are very fortunate to have him.

EUCHARISTIC ASSISTANTS

Each year the Bishop gives permission to members of the congregation to administer the chalice during Holy Communion. I am pleased to report that I have applied for, and received, the Bishop's permission for Marie Burrowes and David Cromie to continue in this important role. In addition, Alan McCracken is also permitted to administer the chalice as part of his role as Student Reader with us over the next six months or so.

SOCIAL AND FUNDRAISING EVENTS

The Events & Organisations Committee would like to hear from parishioners who have ideas for social or fundraising events. Although all ideas will be welcomed, we have a particular need to organise activities that would appeal to people in their 30s and 40s.

In all our activities, our intention is to bring people together for friendship and fun, and even wherever possible to raise a little bit of money for parish projects. If you can think of something that you would like to organise, or even if you would just like to suggest an idea that other people might run with, then please contact me.

EVENING SERVICES

Many years ago, I recall finishing my Sunday dinner, and thinking that I would go to a church near to the house that I had recently moved into. But alas - it was shut! It only opened on the first Sunday evening of each month. And so I went to a church a little further up the road, and within a few short years I had made that other church my spiritual home. Now, imagine someone in our local area considering coming to St Peter's, and yet they are confronted with a locked door for well over half of the Sunday evenings each year. And then we bemoan the fact that we can't build up a decent congregation on Sunday evenings! In order to remedy this, I am going to experiment with a service at 6.30pm every Sunday in November and December. There will be no choir at these additional services, and with the congregation expected to be fairly small, we will meet in the north aisle of the church, which we have renamed as the St James' Side Chapel. Services will be said versions of Evening Prayer, Compline, and the Late Evening Office. In such an intimate setting, there will be a greater focus on Biblical exposition, prayer, and quiet reflection. I am telling you this now, a month in advance, so that you have a chance to think about whether or not you would like to support this new venture yourselves, or even to mention it to anyone you know who might prefer to worship in the evenings.

DIOCESAN SYNOD

The annual Diocesan Synod takes place this year on Wednesday 28th September. As in recent years, the Synod has met in Carrickfergus, for Holy Communion in St Nicholas', and then a meeting in the adjacent Methodist Church. The Synod provides the Bishop with an opportunity to share his thoughts with the gathered clerical and lay representatives, as well as dealing with practical and financial business. The Synod also elects members

of the Diocesan Council and various committees, although this is primarily done through postal vote prior to the meeting. Parish clergy are automatically members of the Synod, but every three years each parish also elects two lay representatives per cleric. Currently our delegates are Jim Tweedie and Wes Holmes. Parishes can also send an additional parishioner so long as they are aged under 44 years. We do not presently use this right, but we hope to do so next Easter, when we have the opportunity to elect the representatives for the next three years.

BENEVOLENT FUND

The family of anyone newly baptised in St Peter's is encouraged to make a donation to our Benevolent Fund, which is intended to be used to help parishioners who find themselves in financial difficulties. A small grant (or loan, if the recipient prefers) of up to around £50 is available per person on each occasion. Naturally, in difficult circumstances, the same parishioner can ask for help more than once. This money is to be used primarily for practical assistance: to put food on the table, or to ensure that they have heating, or even to put a roof over their head. Sadly, our funds are not exhaustive, and so only in very pressing cases can we give beyond the limit of £50. If you would like to avail of this, please be assured that you will be dealt with in strict confidentiality, and if appropriate, we will certainly do everything we can to help. On the other hand, if you would like to make a donation to the Benevolent Fund, then please write a cheque payable to "St Peter & St James, Belfast", with "Benevolent Fund" written on the back, or make a cash contribution in an envelope marked "Benevolent Fund", and give it to myself or our Treasurer, Ashlee McCune.

HARVEST JAZZ

On Saturday 17th September, we had our Harvest Jazz social event. There were nearly 100 people in attendance, including many non-parishioners, and we dined on delicious Irish Stew and Apple Pie. For our entertainment, in addition to the excellent Martello Jazz Band, we were very fortunate to have our very own parishioner and chorister, Glenn Tweedie, regale us with a superb solo performance of operatic and traditional music. It was a thoroughly enjoyable evening, and on behalf of all present, I thank the group of ladies who organised it: Annette Beattie, Daphne McClements, Sandra Hutchman, Dora Hanna, and their helpers on the night. Thank you, as well, to all who came along, and in the process of having a great evening, also raised funds for the parish.

ALL SAINTS' DAY

As a departure from previous years, we will not have an evening service on All Saints' Day. In recent years, this was an opportunity for us to light candles and remember our loved ones, particularly those now deceased. Despite tinkering in the last three years with the style and content of that service, I am still not convinced about how helpful it is to those who attend. So instead—at least for this year—I will continue to light candles for each person buried through the parish in the last two years, and read aloud their name, but this will be done at the beginning of the 11am service instead. Hopefully this context will give us a more positive experience in which to remember the faithful departed, than the sombreness that the evening service tends to invoke. I will, as always, be pleased to receive constructive feedback and suggestions about how best we can appropriately honour the memory of our loved ones in church in future.

SERVICES IN OCTOBER

There are five **Holy Days** in the next month. We will commemorate the life and witness of **St Philip the Deacon** at 7.30pm on Tuesday 11th October. **St Luke** the Evangelist will be commemorated at 7.30pm one week later on Tuesday 18th October. We will then commemorate **St James, the Brother of our Lord**, at our services on Sunday 23rd October. Then at 11am on Friday 28th October we will commemorate **St Simon and St Jude**. To make sure that no saint is forgotten, we celebrate **All Saints' Day** on Sunday 30th October. Properly this latter Holy Day falls on the 1st November, but for parish worship it is appropriate to transfer it to the nearest Sunday.

Unfortunately, work does not always go smoothly, and we can find ourselves in a constant battle with both the elements and time. We have recently had problems with the metal grills protecting the windows, and hope to have these replaced with polycarbonate glazing. While this would be a long term project, and an expensive one at that, it would provide for better protection while removing obstructions to the light entering the church. Given the great affection we all feel for the stained glass (never mind the high repair cost!), I am sure you would all be very supportive of these moves.

Other work is ongoing. Due to a gap in the lead flashing in the roof over the hall foyer, water damage has resulted, and discussions are now ongoing with the original builders. Work has also been ongoing with the electrics. Not only may you have spotted fire alarms throughout the building, but I am sure many will be pleased to know that a security light has been installed above the entrance to the halls. This should make visits in the coming winter nights much more comfortable.

The Select Vestry is also looking at obtaining a defibrillator, and we are exploring where it should be situated, and who should be trained in using it. God willing, it is never necessary, but it is best to be prepared for all eventualities.

This necessary work all requires money, and the Select Vestry would continue to encourage all parishioners to give generously.
