

RECTOR'S NOTES

PASTORAL VISITS

The notices on our service sheets now convey a reminder to contact me regarding arranging a pastoral visit. If you haven't already done so, please pick up the phone (90 777 053) or send me an email (brianlacey@hotmail.co.uk), as it is vitally important that I see every one of you. These visits go beyond the merely social "More tea, vicar?" conversations that we can so easily slip into, and instead my intention is to have a proper discussion about the Christian faith. To do so, I need to ask questions about your understanding of God and Christianity. But, and I must stress this, it is not a test! The purpose is to enable me, as your Rector, to determine what the spiritual state of this parish is, and then to take remedial action to build up the kingdom of God here amongst us. Please welcome this endeavour; as I've pointed out before, to have a conversation with a clergyman without discussing your spiritual health is no different to having a conversation with a doctor and never mentioning your physical health. But I am leaving the initiative with you, for whilst I will repeatedly encourage all of you to arrange a visit from me, the responsibility lies with you to do so.

Such a visit is of course different from a visit in the case of ill-health, which is intended to bring comfort from prayer and the Scriptures, rather than discussing your faith (unless, as is sometimes the case, such a conversation would be helpful under the circumstances). As always, if you or a loved one could benefit from such a visit, please contact me.

CHURCH ATTENDANCE

Once upon a time, a parish could determine how many regular worshippers it had based on who attended every Sunday, whereas we now count the number who come at least once a month. Sadly,

in our increasingly secular world, the frequency of church attendance — even by staunch churchgoers - has greatly reduced. We need to improve this situation. At my last reckoning, I counted 110 regular worshippers, many of whom come to St Peter's once every few weeks. Wouldn't it be fantastic if the whole bunch of us were together every single Sunday?! Let's make it a priority to be together weekly to worship God, to learn more about him, and to pray to him.

Of course, if you genuinely are busy at 11am on Sunday mornings, then we also have our service of Holy Communion at 10.30am every Wednesday, and we have Holy Communion at 9am every Sunday, and for most of the year we have Choral Evensong fortnightly at 6.30pm on Sundays. We also have saints' days throughout the year which are celebrated on weekdays as announced. So there is no shortage of church services in St Peter's to attend! We just need to work on our motivation, and remember that our Lord Jesus deserves to be our priority.

YEAR OF DISCIPLESHIP

Until Easter 2016 our primary focus as a parish will be on developing our personal and corporate discipleship. This means that we will be learning more about how Jesus wants us to live, and we will be seeking new ways of deepening our relationship with God. To do this, there are quite a few ideas that we need to put into practice over the coming months. As with all things, my ideas are worth nothing without your support and encouragement. So please play your own part in building up St Peter's by involving yourself in these various projects.

At Easter I informed you that each year I will run a short **Membership Course** (three one-hour sessions) for new members of our congregation. The course will examine the history and traditions of the Church of Ireland, provide an overview of the Bible

and Christian theology, and summarise the teachings and actions of Jesus, and consider how to put these into practice ourselves. I would of course encourage all existing members of our congregation to undertake this course, in order that all of our members have a common level of understanding. The three sessions of this course will be run at several times over the coming months in order that everyone can pick a time that suits their own schedule. I will be asking you to register for each session, so please do make a point of signing up for them.

We currently have two **Bible Study Groups**: one on a Thursday evening, and another on Friday morning, both of which meet fortnightly. Such groups work best with around six people, as it means everyone has an opportunity to contribute their opinion. I would like to form more groups, and in particular I would like a group just for men, and another group for young adults (aged 20 – 40). Several parishioners have expressed concerns that such Bible studies might be very formal or too academic for them, whereas in truth they are quite relaxed and informative, and we are free to critique and question the meaning of the passages we study.

There is a Ladies' Guild in St Peter's which has been going strong for many years. However, attempts at a similar **Men's Society** has proven to be more difficult to sustain for various reasons. Most recently the men from our parish had joined with men from the local Methodist church, and together we had breakfast once a month following which we listened to an invited speaker. Unfortunately unless a few men rise to the challenge of organising the group, nothing will happen. There are a number of fundraising projects that a men's society could organise, such as monthly car boot sales, which could provide a focus for the group. But we do need two or three people to turn ideas into reality. Speak to me if you think you would like to be involved in developing this group.

Regularly communicating with God - telling him our hopes and dreams, our fears and sorrows, and learning how to hear to him speaking to us - is vitally important in the life of any follower of Jesus. I want us explore new ways of praying, both as individuals and as a community, and this will be partly discussed in our new Membership Course. Moreover, I intend to form a Prayer Team. Initially this will consist of perhaps six people, one of whom will be designated as the contact person for parishioners who wish the parish to offer prayers for themselves or someone else. The contact person will pray privately for the person, and then they will contact the next person in the Prayer Team, who will then pray privately for the person, and then they will contact another person in the Prayer Team who will do the same, and so on until the last person contacts the leader of the Prayer Team to tell them that the prayers have been passed down through all members. This is essentially a prayer chain, and it has proven to be very welcome and effective in other parishes. The leader of the Prayer Team would also inform me of the request for prayer, and I will add their name to the list for prayers on Wednesday mornings.

It always surprises me when parishioners say that they do not know other parishioners, despite sitting close to them every Sunday in church for many years. To counter this, many parishes have developed **House Groups**, to which six or seven people in a geographical area meet in one person's house each month (either the same house each time, or rotating between different houses). There would be a topic to discuss (perhaps a Bible study, or some other form of discipleship course) and an opportunity to get to know each other a little better. I would like to set up four initial House Groups in the coming months: a group of parishioners from the Jordanstown/Carrickfergus area, another in the Glengormley area, another for parishioners living on the North Circular Road side of the Antrim Road, and another group for those living opposite on the Lansdowne Road side.

SOUTH PORCH BOOK STALL

There is a shelf at the back of the church on which there is a small library of books available for loan, overseen by Wes Holmes. Please do use this library, as there are some excellent theology books that you might find enlightening!

Quite separately from the lending library, I would like to encourage you to bring down any books which we can then sell from the south porch in the church. We can take any books, on any subject, so long as they are in good condition and might be of interest to other parishioners. We will use an honesty box, so people can buy some books and make a voluntary donation for them by popping some coins (or notes) in the tin. All money raised will go towards parish funds.

CHURCH SERVICES IN SEPTEMBER

September is always an awkward month, as we shift up a gear from the leisurely summer into the busy season of the Church running up to Christmas. To ease ourselves gently into our normal pattern of worship, the **Choir** will resume their duties on Sunday 6th September, but our services of Choral Evensong will not recommence until Sunday 20th September. Now would be a great time to speak to me or to Robert, our Choirmaster, if you feel God calling you to join the Choir.

We are celebrating two holy days in September: the birth of the **Blessed Virgin Mary** on Tuesday 8th, and **St Matthew** on Monday 21st. There will be a service of Holy Communion (traditional language) at 7.30pm on both of those dates. Please note that, because I will be away, there will be no celebration on the feast day of St Michael and all Angels, which falls on Tuesday 29th September.

For our young families, our monthly Family Service will resume in

the Halls on Sunday 13th September. It has been great to witness Frank, our Families Worker, growing in confidence amongst us over the past six months, so please continue to support him as he leads this child-friendly form of worship by bringing your children and grandchildren, and by encouraging your friends and neighbours to do the same. As always, we all sit together in the Church at the beginning of the service. Would parents also note that the Sunday School will resume from the following Sunday, 20th September.

Our **Harvest Thanksgiving** this year will be celebrated on Sunday 27^{th} September at the 11am service. Harvest services are traditionally held on the Sunday following the full moon at the end of September, which is known as the Harvest Moon. This year, however, the Harvest Moon occurs on Sunday 27^{th} , and so our service will be held on that precise date. Preparations for the service (including bringing flowers, fruit, and vegetables to the church) will take place on the morning of Saturday 26^{th} September from 10am. As usual there will be a collection of food (tins, tea, coffee, etc) which will be donated to the Welcome Centre for homeless people in the city. See note below.

HARVEST DECORATION

This year our Harvest Thanksgiving will be held on Sunday 27th September. As always, we need volunteers, both men and women, to help with the decoration of the church. We hope that as many people as possible will come along on <u>Saturday 26th September at 10am</u> to lend a hand. (Children please come

along at 11am to do your own decorating with our Sunday School teachers).

We also need gifts of flowers, fruit, vegetables and groceries which will then be donated as stated in the Rector's Notes.
