RECTOR'S NOTES

PASTORAL MINISTRY

MEETINGS

Our next **Parish Meeting** will be held at 7pm (note the new time) in the Minor Hall on Monday 3rd September. Remember that this is your opportunity to offer constructive advice on how to develop the ministries of the parish, so don't sit at home silently if you have an idea about something new we should be considering, or how we could do things more effectively. Be there and use your voice! All parishioners are welcome.

The next meeting of the **Select Vestry** will be at 7.30pm in the Minor Hall on Monday 17th September. The minutes of the previous meeting will soon be available for members of the committee to collect at the back of the church.

FELLOWSHIP GROUPS

Following the summer break, our **Thursday Fellowship** group, which meets from 7.30pm-9pm on the first, second, and fourth Thursdays of each month, will resume on Thursday 6th September. We always begin with prayers, normally using the

Late Evening Office, or Holy Communion on Holy Days. Afterwards we have refreshments and Bible Study, in which we will be continuing to read the Acts of the Apostles.

The **Friday Fellowship** group, which meets from 11.30am-1pm on the first and third Fridays of each month, will resume on Friday 7th September. Refreshments are served, and then we have Bible Study—resuming the book of 1 Samuel.

From the 16th September we will also have a **Sunday Fellowship** group, meeting from 9.45am-10.30am each week. This will be a very informal gathering, with tea/coffee and maybe even a light breakfast (toast!) in which we will explore the Christian faith in a conversational way, using various discipleship courses as the basis of our discussions. If you're a parent then feel free to bring your children along too and let them play in the background, or even join in the conversation if they like!

SERVICES IN SEPTEMBER

The first Sunday in the month (2nd September) sees the welcome return of our choir to both the 11am and 6.30pm Sunday services following their summer break. At the beginning of the morning service we will therefore dedicate the members of the choir for the year ahead.

On Sunday 9th September at 11am we will have a **Songs of Praise** service. No, the BBC won't be there filming us, but we will have a selection of well-known and much-loved hymns alongside appropriate Bible readings and prayers.

On Sunday 16th September we will have "**Back to Church Sunday**" which will focus on a celebration of Holy Communion at 11am, with various parts of our Anglican service briefly explained, in order to enable new (or perhaps even long-time) members understand why we worship as we do. The Sunday School and Toddlers' Crèche will also resume on this day.

On the last Sunday of the month (30th September) it's our annual **Harvest Thanksgiving**. As I explain every year, the date of our Harvest service is on the Sunday following the full moon closest to the Autumn Equinox. The date therefore fluctuates between early September and early October. In addition to needing your donations of fruit, vegetables, and flowers to decorate St Peter's, we will also be making our usual donation of tinned goods, tea/coffee, cereals, and hygiene products to the Welcome Organisation, which cares for the homeless.

ST JAMES' REREDOS

The Representative Church Body which owns St Peter's has given permission for the wooden reredos from St James to be relocated to St Peter's. A reredos is the ornamentation behind a Communion Table, and in St Peter's our reredos is the beautiful stone carving of the women bringing perfume to anoint Jesus' body, only to be told by two angels that he has risen. The reredos from St James is quite different. Rather than stone, it is a series of wooden panels with beautiful paintwork depicting our Lord Jesus and the four Archangels: Gabriel, Michael, Raphael, and Uriel. As this wonderful piece of art is in serious danger of water damage in St James, it will be moved to the north aisle of



St Peter's, with the Communion Table from St James slotted into it, as it was designed to do. Depending on various factors, this might already have happened by the time you are reading this. If not, it should be done during September. I do hope that former parishioners of St James' will enjoy seeing this lovely piece of their history, and that it will further cement the union of the two parishes.

EUROPEAN HERITAGE OPEN DAYS

I am very grateful to all those parishioners who took a little bit of time out of their summer in order to open St Peter's to the public at the end of July and beginning of August: Peter Mulligan, Quintin Mulligan, Annette Beattie, Noel Beattie, Valerie Guest, Margi Crawford, Rosemary Johnston, Jill Bradley, Dora Hanna, Brian Johnson, and David Cromie. Many thanks to all of you. Throughout the week we had a number of visitors come in, from both the local area and much farther afield. All of them remarked on how beautiful St Peter's is!

On Saturday 8th and Sunday 9th September the church will be open again to the public to wander around from 10am-5pm (excluding times of worship). This is part of the European Heritage Open Days, during which places of importance or special interest (many of which normally charge an entrance fee) will be open to visitors. This is the first year for some time that St Peter's has been publicised on the list of places to visit, so hopefully we will have some tourists from all around the world. We do need volunteers to supervise the church, and I suggest we only need two people at any time, with nobody doing more than a three or four hour stint. We therefore need around eight people to volunteer. You won't necessarily have to give a guided tour; all you need to do is make sure the building is safe, and be on hand to answer any straightforward questions you might be asked. Please speak to me if you would like to help.

SIDESPERSON

At our Select Vestry meeting in September, we will need to appoint a fourth Sidesperson, following the elevation of Dora Hanna to Churchwarden. The Sidespersons assist and deputise for the Churchwardens at the 11am and 6.30pm Sunday services. This could include duties such as counting the number of worshippers, collecting Free Will Offerings, lighting candles, turning on the lights/heat/sound, and helping to secure the building at the end of the service. If you would like to be considered for this role then please speak with me as soon as possible for more details.

FLOOR POLISHER

The Very Rev'd Brian Moller has very kindly donated a Floor Polisher to the parish for use on our wooden and tiled floors. Even a quick use of the machine brought up plenty of dirt, so perhaps once a month I'll make a point of giving the floors a good scrub. It's actually quite therapeutic once you get the swing of it! On that note, our wooden floors are in serious need of re-varnishing, so if there's time in the coming months, we might use the



polisher to scrub off the top layer of old varnish in a corner of the church, and apply a new layer, just as a test—both of how effective the machine is, and how effective we are at varnishing floors! It's great to have the ability to attempt this by ourselves, and I am very grateful to the Rev'd Moller for his generosity.

INCH ABBEY



Despite my fears that there would be torrential rain, I was delighted that the sun was shining on our parish trip to Inch Abbey on Wednesday 8th August. We had a picnic when we arrived, followed by a tour of the ruins, and then a short celebration of Holy Communion in the exact place where the monks would have celebrated Mass hundreds of years ago. It was a lovely afternoon, and having received positive feedback, I suggest that we aim to have similar trips to interesting places every summer. Let me know if you have any ideas for places to go next year.

Clive Scoular is an enthusiastic speaker and author with a passion for Ireland and its history.

<u>Vere Foster</u>: known as a philanthropist, educationalist and social reformer, Vere was born in Amsterdam, Netherlands, where his diplomat father was posted. He was actively involved in Irish society and is well known for his involvement in education, health and immigration of Northern Ireland, both long before and after settling in Belfast in 1867.

<u>Grace O'Malley</u>: aka 'The Sea Queen of Connacht' or 'Pirate Queen Grace'. Upon her father's death Grace took over leadership of his clan in West Ireland. Grace had a fascination with the sea as well as warfare and was a most competent leader in her own right.


