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RECTOR'S NOTES



SERVICES IN JULY AND AUGUST

The 11am service will be the only act of worship on Sundays during July and August. Our 10am and 6pm Sunday services will resume in September.

Throughout the two months, we continue our usual pattern of Holy Communion on the first and third Sundays, and Morning Prayer on the second and fourth Sundays. There is a fifth Sunday in July, which will be a Service of the Word. With one Sunday excepted, the choir will be taking a well-deserved break.

There are two holy days: On Sunday 23rd July, we will celebrate Holy Communion (Form One) on the feast day of our "other" patron saint, James the Apostle, with the choir returning to their stalls. On Sunday 6th August, we will celebrate Transfiguration Sunday.

Whether you are at home or farther afield, and whether it is sunny or raining, please make worship a priority. And if you should have the chance to join a congregation in an exotic or far off place, spare a prayer for the rest of us back home in Belfast.

ANNIVERSARIES

I tend not to dwell too much on ministerial anniversaries, but I was delighted—to my great surprise—that my ten year anniversary in St Peter & St James was remembered following

the 11am service on Sunday 18th June. The choir chanted a lovely poem written about me by David Cromie, Daphne McClements presented me with a bottle of champagne and a gift voucher for what-will-be a much appreciated dinner for Laura and myself, and Ashlee McCune hosted a drinks reception. It was kind of all involved to take valuable time on Father's Day to remember me, and to present me with such thoughtful gifts. As I said in my "thank you" speech, I am very blessed to have been called to minister amongst you, and I look forward to what the next ten years have in store.

Probably more of interest to myself than anyone else, this time of year is full of ministerial anniversaries for me: I was ordained deacon on 11th June 2010 in St Nicholas', Carrickfergus, then ordained priest on 9th June 2011 in St Patrick's, Ballymoney. I was instituted as Rector of St Peter & St James on 17th June 2013, and then concurrently appointed Rural Dean of North Belfast on 16th July 2018, and Priest-in-Charge of St Paul & St Barnabas on 8th June 2022. I am grateful to our Lord God for every door which he opens for me to exercise ministry in his name. Please do pray for me as I pray for you as we continue on our journey of faith together.

NOT-SO MYSTERY WORSHIPPER

You have probably heard of "mystery shoppers", employed by companies to secretly report on the conduct of staff. Believe it or not, there are even "mystery worshippers"! These are people who visit churches incognito and report their experience. They comment upon the general appearance of the building and grounds, the atmosphere in the church before the service begins, how interesting the sermon was, how friendly the congregation were, and so on.

As part of a reciprocal arrangement with St Paul's on York Road, several of their members have been asked to come to St Peter's

at some time over the summer and feed back their findings. Similarly, I will ask some of our members to visit St Paul's and do the same there. Although being anonymous might help a little, I will undoubtedly recognise anyone from the other congregation coming to St Peter's, so there's no point in our trying to be secretive: 'Mystery' worshippers can be quite open and honest about what they're doing, and certainly nobody will be required to wear a fake beard ... unless they want to.

At the same time, I will be issuing simple questionnaires to our own congregation, asking similar questions to those being answered by the mystery worshippers who come from St Paul's. The intention is that we then compare how we view ourselves as a worshipping community with how a visitor perceives us. This knowledge will then enable us to tweak what we do in order to ensure that anyone—especially prospective new members—feel that they can truly worship God in St Peter's.

HOLIDAYS

All being well, I will be taking some time off over the summer. During my absence, please contact the Rev'd Andrew Irwin on 028 9600 5015. His contact details will also be on the Rectory answer machine message. My mobile phone will be switched off when I am away, so please do not text me anything urgent, as I will not see it until I return to duty.

BIBLE FELLOWSHIP

As a trial over the summer months, our Bible Fellowship will meet at 11.15am each Wednesday (unless I am off on holiday), lasting for one hour. There will be no sermon during the preceding celebration of Holy Communion, so those services will be a little shorter, and we will still have plenty of time for tea/coffee in between. Although I would encourage you to join us for Holy Communion beforehand, feel free to join us at 11.15am. Throughout the summer, we will continue reading through the Gospel according to St Matthew.

THE LIFE OF SAINT BARNABAS

St Barnabas is probably not someone that you have heard a lot about. And yet, from the scant information recorded in the New Testament, it is clear that he had an important role in the development of the early Church. Let's see what we can glean from Scripture about him:

"There was a Levite, a native of Cyprus, Joseph, to whom the apostles gave the name Barnabas, which means son of encouragement." (Acts 4:36) We learn six facts from this one verse. First, the name Barnabas is a nickname. His real name was Joseph. Second, on the basis that his nickname means "Son of Encouragement" it's probably fair to guess that he was an encouraging personality. Third, the fact that he was given such a nickname by the Apostles, indicates that those closest to Jesus (the Twelve Disciples, minus Judas) knew him well. Fourth, he was from the island of Cyprus. Fifth, he was a Jew. We can tell this because we are told that he was a Levite. And, related to that, sixth, his family (historically at least) would have served in the temple in Jerusalem as assistants to the priests, as this was the role given to the tribe of Levi.

Throughout the Book of the Acts of the Apostles, Barnabas is mentioned alongside St Paul. There is a suggestion, although not from a Biblical source, that the two men met each other in their youth when Paul was a student of Gamaliel in Jerusalem, when he first joined the Pharisees. It is possible that Barnabas was also there at the same time. But however they first met, Barnabas was clearly trusted by Paul, and—more importantly he believed that Paul had converted from being an enemy of Christianity, to a keen supporter of the new religion. We know this because after Paul's conversion experience, when the apostles would naturally have suspected that Paul was lying in order to infiltrate the Church, we read in Acts 9:27, "Barnabas took him, brought him to the apostles, and described for them how on the road he had seen the Lord, who had spoken to him, and how in Damascus he had spoken boldly in the name of Jesus."

So Barnabas is vouching for Paul, and—importantly—the apostles believe what Barnabas tells them. This in and of itself, tells us that Barnabas was known to the apostles, and that their relationship with him was such that they trusted what he had to say. In fact, there is a tradition which states that Barnabas was one of the Seventy disciples, who were sent out by Jesus, to proclaim the Good News during our Lord's earthly life.

The other Apostles, evidently, trusted him to carry out important missions on their behalf: "News of this came to the ears of the church in Jerusalem, and they sent Barnabas to Antioch." (Acts 11:22); "this they did, sending it to the elders by Barnabas and Saul." (Acts 11:30); "Then after completing their mission Barnabas and Saul returned to Jerusalem and brought with them John, whose other name was Mark." (Acts 12:25). More than that, Barnabas was evidently trusted by God himself: "While they were worshipping the Lord and fasting, the Holy Spirit said, 'Set apart for me Barnabas and Saul for the work to which I have called them." (Acts 13:2)

You will notice in most of those verses, that Barnabas is mentioned alongside Saul (which is, of course, St Paul's Hebrew name). What's interesting is that Barnabas is named first, which indicates that in the early years of their shared missions, he was the better known of the two. After a while, this does change, and by the end of the Acts of the Apostles, the pair are referred to as "Paul and Barnabas". Here's are two examples: "When the meeting of the synagogue broke up, many Jews and devout converts to Judaism followed Paul and Barnabas, who spoke to them and urged them to continue in the grace of God." (Acts 13:43); "But the Jews incited the devout women of high standing and the leading men of the city, and stirred up persecution against Paul and Barnabas, and drove them out of their

region." (Acts 13:50)

Paul's ascendancy as the dominant one, likely begins when he had a major argument with the other Apostles. Their disagreement was on the question of whether or not non-Jewish converts to Christianity, needed to become Jews as well-which would mean obeying the Jewish laws (such as what you could eat) and, for men, it would require being circumcised. Paul vehemently disagreed with this idea. As far as he was concerned, we are saved by grace, rather than through adherence to the law or outward signs of religion. And so he challenged the other apostles. In fact, in Paul's letter to the Galatians, he reflects upon the argument, saying that St Peter-in what Paul considered to be an act of cowardice-had stopped eating with gentile converts when Peter feared being seen with them by strict Jewish Christians. Paul openly condemned Peter for this. And whilst it probably did not win him any friends, it may well have earned him respect. For he stood his ground, challenging the chief apostle. Barnabas, on the other hand, was swayed, and much to Paul's disappointment, he bought into the idea that Gentiles needed to become Jews. Paul wrote: "the other Jews joined Peter in this hypocrisy, so that even Barnabas was led astray by their hypocrisy." (Galatians 2:13) Presumably, once St Peter saw the error of his ways, Barnabas and the others followed suit. But the damage had been done. Paul's hardline stance in defence of the Gospel led him to take the lead, and no doubt that's one reason why you have all heard of St Paul, but many have never heard of St Barnabas.

We don't know much more about him, as he slips out of the Biblical narrative following another disagreement with Paul. This time, it concerned who would accompany the two of them as they travelled around the Mediterranean, visiting the congregations which they had planted. Barnabas wanted them to bring with them his young cousin—a man called John Mark, but Paul rejected the idea. We read in Acts 15:39, "*The disagreement became so sharp that they parted company; Barnabas took [John] Mark*

with him and sailed away to Cyprus." As a little aside, this John Mark would later become the author of the Gospel according to Mark. But at this stage in his life, St Paul was concerned that he was not as dedicated to the mission of the Church as he should have been. And so Paul disagrees with Barnabas that John Mark should join them. In fact, the word "disagreement" in Greek means a "a violent outburst". This was not just agreeing to disagree. This was a major falling-out. Thus, Paul and Barnabas went their different ways. Barnabas went with John Mark to Cyprus, whilst Paul went on his journey with another disciple called Silas.

That, as far as direct evidence from the Bible is concerned, is the last we hear of Barnabas. A few years later, when Paul is writing one of his letters, he mentions John Mark with great affection, but there is no mention of Barnabas. Potentially the relationship between the two men had remained sour, but it's more likely that Barnabas had died by this stage. There is a tradition that he was attacked when preaching at a synagogue in Salamis in Cyprus, which is where he was originally from. Non-Christian Jews at the Synagogue were so angered by his proclamation of the Good News, that they tied a rope around his neck and dragged him outside, where—depending on the version of the story—he was either stoned or burned to death.

Sadly, there are none of Barnabas' writings in the Bible. But what is clear from the various mentions of him in the New Testament, is that although he might be considered today to be a minor character in the Acts of the Apostles, Barnabas had a major role to play in the development of Christianity and the early Church. He devoted his life to it, and ultimately gave his life for it.
