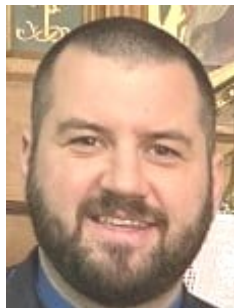

RECTOR'S NOTES



SERVICES IN OCTOBER

Please make every effort to worship God in St Peter's at our Harvest Thanksgiving on Sunday 1st October! If you would like to help decorate the church with flowers, or to donate fruit and vegetables for display, then come along around 10am on Saturday 30th September.

In addition to Harvest Thanksgiving, there are three Holy Days this month: Saint Philip the Deacon (Wednesday 11th October), Saint Luke (Wednesday 18th October), and All Saints (Sunday 29th October).

For our Harvest Thanksgiving on **1st October**, please bring along food or hygiene products for the Welcome Organisation to any of our services. There will be a Family Service at 10am, Choral Eucharist at 11am, and Choral Evensong at 6pm.

On **8th October**, there will be Holy Communion in traditional language at 10am, followed by Choral Matins at 11am.

On **15th October**, there will be Morning Prayer at 10am, followed by Choral Eucharist at 11am.

On **22nd October**, there will be Holy Communion at 10am, followed by Choral Matins at 11am.

On **29th October**, which is All Saints' Day, there will be Morning Prayer in traditional language at 10am, followed by a Service of Wholeness and Healing at 11am. During this latter service, the names of parishioners whose funerals were held in the last two years will be read aloud.

CHILDREN'S PARTY

There will be bouncy castles, homemade pizza, and ice cream in the halls on Saturday 30th September. This party is aimed at primary school children, but pre-school children are certainly welcome if under constant supervision. Doors open at 1pm, and close at 4pm.

FAMILY SERVICES

From Sunday 1st October, our Family Services will resume on the first Sunday of each month at 10am. These services last for just under 30 minutes, using a simplified form of Anglican worship, and include a straightforward message pitched at primary school level. I would like the children and their parents to be involved in all aspects of this service, therefore we need to develop a rota for lectors, intercessors, and Junior Churchwardens. It is vital that we encourage children to learn to get involved in worship, so please do work with me as we develop this.

If you are able to play a **musical instrument**, and would like to volunteer to accompany one or two simple hymns during the Family Service, please let me know as soon as possible. Your help would be greatly appreciated.

It might seem a bit early, but this is the time of year for us to start preparing for our **Nativity Service**. Given that Christmas Eve is a Sunday this year, it might be beneficial for us to hold the Nativity Service a week earlier on Sunday 17th December. I'll contact parents about this directly, but let me know now if you would like to help with this, please.

KIDS' CHURCH

I'm delighted that Cheryl Hurson has volunteered to lead Kids' Church again this year. This will start on Sunday 8th October. We would like the children to stay in the church for the first five minutes before heading down to the halls, and remaining there

until approximately 10.40am. Please contact Cheryl if you have any questions about this.

DISCIPLESHIP AND BIBLE STUDY

I encourage all of you, in the strongest possible terms, to come along to at least one of the following groups during October. It is very important for our spiritual health as individuals and as a community, that we learn the core truths of Christianity.

Our **Discipleship Group** will meet at 7.30pm on Thursday 5th October, in which we will be learning about “The Afterlife”.

On Thursday 12th and 26th October, our **Bible Fellowship** will continue studying the Gospel according to St Matthew, again at 7.30pm.

On Thursday 19th October, there will be prayers and Bible study online using **ZOOM**, at 2pm.

On Wednesday 25th October, our monthly mid-week **Bible Study** will meet at 11.30am, in which we will examine the Book of the Prophet Micah.

PRAYER MINISTRY

You are regularly encouraged in the Parish Notes to telephone Rosemary Johnston to ask her to add your name to our prayer list. To broaden that appeal, I have added an online prayer request form on our parish website, and I heartily encourage you to use it. The web address is:

In October, we will begin the process of formally offering prayer ministry following the 11am service. We will do this initially on the second and fourth Sundays (8th and 22nd October). I appreciate that there is always reluctance or nervousness when we trial new ideas, but please don't hold back if you would like to be prayed with. I will announce the practicalities on those two Sunday mornings. Please remember, though, that you are always welcome to request prayer for yourself or a loved one at any time,

and I would be delighted to help in this way. Our Lord Jesus wants to offer you healing in whatever would make your life better. Please ask for it!

FORMER YOUTH WORKERS



Currently the Curate of Carrickfergus, the Rev'd Nathan Ervine is due to take up his new role as Priest-in-Charge of the parish of Monkstown. As many of you will remember, Nathan was our Youth Worker prior to moving to Dublin for training for ordination.

His new position will be an interesting and challenging one, as the Church of the Good Shepherd in Monkstown is a joint Church of Ireland – Methodist congregation. Please remember Nathan, his wife Grace, and their two young sons in your prayers. His Service of Introduction is likely to be held in early December.

Similarly, another former Youth Worker has also recently undertaken a new role. Frank Dillon, who is currently working as Community Chaplain in the parish of St Stephen & St Luke on the Shankhill Road, was licensed as a Parish Reader on Monday 18th September. It is great that St Peter's has been able to play even a small part in providing both Nathan and Frank with opportunities to develop their understanding of ministry.

BAPTISM AND CONFIRMATION

It is always a privilege for me to baptise new members into the Christian Church, and this now includes Nigel Macauley, who was baptised on Sunday 17th September (see front cover). Nigel joined our congregation on Pentecost Sunday, and – I'm very pleased to say – he felt welcomed enough to want to keep coming back!

As someone who was myself baptised in my early twenties, I can testify that the baptism of adults is not a rare occurrence. However, in the Church of Ireland, it is much more common for babies or young children to be baptised, with their parents

promising to raise them within the Christian community until they are old enough to profess their faith themselves. This later profession of faith is called Confirmation, and it is an important moment in which a person of any age takes ownership of the faith that was entrusted to others at their baptism.

I have asked Bishop George to consider conducting a Service of Confirmation at some stage in the middle of next year – close to St Peter's Day. If you are an adult who was baptised as an infant, but have never been Confirmed, then please let me know. Likewise, if you have children – around fourteen years old – who would like to be Confirmed, then get in touch. There will be a Confirmation Class in the new year. Let me know as quickly as possible if you are interested.

HARVEST COLLECTION

Envelopes are now available for our special collection for Harvest, and I encourage you please to be generous. In addition to our routine running costs, there are a number of expensive repairs and improvements required in our church property over the next few years, and it is vital that we raise the funds to afford these. Any extra donation that you can make would be greatly appreciated.

And please don't forget that if you tend to do your shopping online, then **Easyfundraising** will enable you to contribute to the parish whilst you shop! You simply need to register with them, and then select *Parish of St Peter and St James, Belfast* as the recipient of a small percentage of any purchases that you make. This costs you nothing extra!

LEARN TO FORGIVE

Everybody is offended these days. It's part of our "woke" culture. For the benefit of those of you who have heard people talking about "being woke" but are too afraid to ask what it means, let me tell you The dictionary definition of a "woke" person is this: Someone who is aware of injustice and inequalities in our society, and who is trying to address them.

That sounds quite good. Its origins lie in – for example - the civil rights movement in America, seeking to end racism. In that sort of context, you can see the injustice and inequality, such as segregated schools for black people and white people, or police brutality towards black people, or less investment and opportunities in black communities. Quite rightly, people have highlighted such injustices and inequalities, with varying degrees of success in terms of how they have been addressed. And this has developed into what is now called “woke culture”. As a society, we are waking up to the fact that things need to change.

But despite that, people tend to use the word “woke” more like a criticism than a compliment. And one of biggest reasons for this is because whereas the intention behind being “woke” was that everybody should have the right to live a normal life as they see fit, without interference from others, and without being judged ... that has been taken to such an extreme, that it has shifted meaning to “nobody is allowed to say anything that I disagree with. And if they do, I’m offended. And if I’m offended, then that person must be cancelled.”

Do you know, in the context of being woke, what it means to be cancelled? It means that if a celebrity on TV says something that some people find offensive, then that celebrity will quickly find that nobody wants to work with them anymore. Nobody will hire them. They will be outcast, and treated with contempt. In the olden days you would have described such as person as having been “black listed”, but even that expression has fallen out of favour in our woke world.

The problem is that there has been this conflation of real social injustice on one hand, and people’s feelings being hurt, on the other. And for some reason, our modern society is going along with the idea that they are one and the same. But they aren’t. I mean, if a policeman in America shoots dead an unarmed black man simply because he’s black, that is an offence to our humanity. Indeed, the word offensive hardly even does it justice. And yet we freely say “I’m offended” whenever we’re a bit miffed because someone expresses an opinion that differs from our own.

What happens then, is that well-meaning people, desiring to be more “woke” than anyone else, will try to change our society in the vain hope that nobody will be offended. And so we get all these guidelines issued, on how not to use language that might be perceived as racist, or sexist, or ageist, or whatever. The intention behind these things is all well and good, but ultimately they don’t stop a racist from being racist, they don’t stop someone who is sexist from being sexist. Instead, they simply seek to prevent good people from making unintentional errors in the language that they use. It’s a bit like that old saying: the lock on your front door is only there to keep honest people out—a burglar will break in, regardless.

Trying to stop people from causing offence, only really works with people who don’t want to cause offence in the first place. So rather than trying to prevent good people from being accidentally offensive, I think our efforts as a society would be better spent on learning how not to be offended.

But don’t get me wrong, if someone is suffering real injustice, then of course something needs to be done about it. I’m talking here specifically about hurt feelings. “He said something that I don’t like, and now I’m not happy. I’m never going to speak to him again. I’m going to block him on social media, and pretend that he doesn’t exist.” That is the level that our society has sunk to. As the Christian Church, it’s about time we challenged that notion.

Look at Matthew 18:21... “*Peter came and said to Jesus, ‘Lord, if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive?’*” I should point out that the original Greek does not say “another member of the church”, it simply says “brother”. This is a good example of how English translators can radically change the meaning of the text. “*Peter came and said to him, ‘Lord, if my brother sins against me, how often should I forgive?’*”

In our woke world, the answer would be “Never!” If your brother has hurt you, cancel him. Erase him from your life. Pretend he doesn’t exist. And then pat yourself on the back for having created a world for yourself in which the horrible people,

like your nasty brother, can't hurt your feelings anymore.

For many people, whether or not they've even heard of the word "woke", such a draconian response to being offended, is unfortunately, the normal response. And I get the reason why. It is entirely natural to want to protect yourself from people who have hurt you, and also – perhaps – try to punish them in a fairly passive aggressive way by distancing yourself from them. But that is not what Jesus expects from us, his followers.

"Peter came and said to him, 'Lord, if my brother sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?' Jesus said to him, 'Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times.'" The original Greek could also be translated as "seventy times seven", but to be honest, the actual number is irrelevant. Jesus is just using a large number in order to suggest unlimited forgiveness.

What he's really saying is: forgive every time. Don't revel in being offended. Don't cut people out of your life because they've let you down. Don't try to create a world in which nobody can ever hurt you again. Why? Because there will always be someone who offends you. There will always be someone who lets you down. There will always be hurt in our relationships. And what's more, not only will that hurt be caused by others ... sometimes it will be caused by you. And if we all just cancel each other every time we have been wronged, then eventually everyone will end up cancelling everyone else.

That fracturing of society, that ending of friendships, that breakdown of relationships, that is what the darkness in this world desperately wants. But it is not what God wants. We see this at the very heart of the gospel, in which Christ died on the Cross for the forgiveness of our sins. Forgiveness, and second chances, and third chances, and fourth chances, and infinite chances – that's what God offers us through Christ. And in response, we are called to forgive others. So whatever else Christianity may demand from us, forgiveness underpins everything. And to be a Christian therefore is to be someone who is forgiven, and who always forgives.

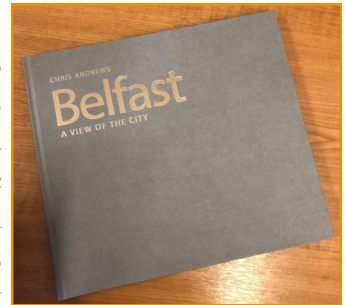

PAUSE FOR THOUGHT AND PRAYER

'Dispensers of fear and hope.'



A meeting took place in September between two of the world's most feared leaders. Kim Jong Un, Leader of North Korea, chugged along gently in his armour-plated train, at approximately 37mph, accompanied by top military personnel, space scientists and others who could do a deal with Russia, and arrived in style in Russia to meet his 'friend', Vladimir Putin, Tsar—sorry, President, of Russia. He wants to build even bigger rockets, acquire spy satellites and nuclear-capable ballistic missile submarines, and hopes he can be given the technology to do so. Meanwhile many of his people back home are starving to death. In exchange Kim Jong Un can supply Vladimir Putin with millions of artillery shells and rockets based on Soviet designs that could give a huge boost to the Russian army in Ukraine—a frightening thought. Vladimir Putin welcomed his 'friend' who can help him replenish his depleted weapons supply. He claims his targets are purely military or industrial, but, as we know only too well it is so often the people who are hit—killed, injured and traumatised, with no apparent hint of remorse. Putin's other 'friend', Patriarch Kirill also seems to show no sign of remorse which, as the leader of Russian Orthodox Church, is worrying. "Kim promises Putin North Korea's full, unconditional support for a 'just fight'". The thought of these two leaders possibly agreeing military co-operation is frightening. With friends like these ...

You probably don't know the other two men—both born in Belfast—that I'm writing about. Patrick lives in west Belfast. He has always been actively involved in his church but does not make a big deal about it. He has had a cancer condition almost all of his life and regularly attends hospital to have cancer nodules removed from his head. But this does not stop him from actively living out his Christian faith. When he is not out at work he looks out for people in his parish—for those who live on their own or who are disabled. He does shopping and other errands for them and takes the elderly to Mass. There are

times, just after undergoing yet more surgery, that he will get someone's shopping or take them to Mass as it is so important to him to help those in need.

Howard trained as an agronomist (someone who studies the science of soil management and crop rotation). He worked for Concern Worldwide and he and his family lived for 18 years in India where, among other things, he managed a sugar factory where he developed a method of running it on methane from cows! He was a great innovator and travelled to many countries such as Cambodia, Haiti and many African countries to improve the people's lives and to provide help in emergencies. He and a doctor developed a pouch containing the necessary nutrients to promote healthy growth in children. They set up a factory so that the local people were employed in providing the pouches. After he retired he still went abroad to help and only claimed his expenses—not for him a grand salary. Sadly, Howard died very suddenly a few weeks ago—but what a legacy he leaves.

We each need to choose whether to do good or evil in this world.

*Heavenly Father:
you have given us freedom of will.
We can choose to do good or evil.
Help us to make the right choice—
to love you and to love our neighbours
and to seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit
