RECTOR'S NOTES



SERVICES IN APRIL

Would all parishioners please make every effort to worship in St Peter's at 10.30am on Easter Day—Sunday 20th April.

On Sunday 6th April, which is **Passion Sunday**, there will be Choral Eucharist at 10.30am. Our guest preacher will be the Archdeacon of Connor, the Venerable Dr Stephen McBride, who served as rector of St Peter's from 1990 until 1995.

On Sunday 13th April, which is **Palm Sunday**, there will be Family Matins at 10.30am.

On Sunday 20th April, which is **Easter Day**, there will be Choral Eucharist at 10.30am. As this is one of the Church's three Principal Holy Days, it is vital that we make a special effort to worship the Risen Christ together.

On Sunday 27th April, which is the **Second Sunday of Easter** (often referred to as Low Sunday) there will be a service of Morning Prayer at 10.30am. Our Ministry Apprentice, Robert Long, will be reflecting upon the Bible readings that day.

Throughout the month, there will be a **midweek** service in St Peter's at 10.30am every Wednesday. On the 23rd April this will be Morning Prayer, and on the 30th April this will be the Middle English (Form One) service of Holy Communion. On all other Wednesdays there will be a Modern English (Form Two) service of Holy Communion.

On the weekdays following Palm Sunday, there will be a **Holy Week** service each evening at 7.30pm. On Fig Monday (14th)

there will be a service of Bible readings and prayers called "The Way of the Cross". On Holy Tuesday (15th) there will be the Late Evening Office. On Spy Wednesday (16th) there will be Evening Prayer. On Maundy Thursday (17th) there will be a Middle English (Form One) celebration of Choral Eucharist, and on Good Friday (18th) there will be a service of Tenebrae, in which there will be music and readings from the passion narrative in John's Gospel.

FAMILY SERVICE

At our Family Service in March, we learned about how our Lord Jesus was tempted in the wilderness. This month we meet on



Palm Sunday (13th April) when we will be thinking about Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem, and his journey to the Cross. Could I please encourage people of all ages to join us as we mark the beginning of Holy Week.

EASTER VESTRY

The management of the parish's human, financial, and physical resources is the responsibility of a committee called the Select Vestry. This committee consists of myself, the two Churchwardens, the two Glebewardens, and up to twelve others elected by and from the registered members of the parish. The election of the Select Vestry takes place at a meeting of the registered members known as the General Vestry. There is one statutory meeting of the General Vestry each year, which must

take place within twenty days before or after Easter Day, from which is derived its name—the Easter Vestry.

The Easter Vestry this year will be held on Sunday 4th May, commencing at 11am in St Peter's. This will follow on immediately from our 10.30am service, which will be shorter than usual. Members of the congregation, even if not registered members of the parish, may stay on for the meeting, but only registered members may participate in the election of the Select Vestry.

Could I encourage all registered members to consider putting their names forward for election to the Select Vestry this year, whilst bearing the following in mind:

- 1. Candidates should ensure that they are available to meet on the third Monday evening of each month.
- 2. The committee has no role in the worship, mission, or ministries of the Church, except in ensuring that adequate resources are in place to sustain these. Members of the committee should therefore have knowledge and/or experience of one of the following: (a) finances; (b) fundraising; (c) human resources; (d) property maintenance; (e) health and safety; (f) the law.
- 3. As the committee of the Church, all of its members should be practicing Christians and regular worshippers in St Peter's.
- 4. The members of the committee are deemed to be Trustees by the Charity Commission for Northern Ireland, and the following people are therefore ineligible to serve: (a) anyone who has been convicted of an offence involving deception or dishonesty, unless the conviction is spent under the Rehabilitation of Offenders (Northern Ireland) Order 1978; (b) anyone who is an undischarged bankrupt or has made an arrangement with creditors; (c) anyone who has previously been removed as a charity trustee by the Commission or the courts; (d) anyone who is subject to disqualification under company legislation.

In addition to the election of the new committee, our Honorary

Treasurer will give an overview of the parish finances during 2024, and will be happy to answer any questions relating to them.

If you are a registered member, but unable to attend the Easter Vestry, please ensure that a Churchwarden or I have received your apology before the meeting begins. This is particularly important for anyone wishing to be nominated for election to the Select Vestry in their absence.

If you have any questions about the Easter Vestry or the Select Vestry, please speak to me.

RURAL DEANERY NEWS

On Wednesday 19th March, the Rev'd Colin Welsh was introduced as the Priest-in-Charge of the parishes of Whitehouse & St Ninian and Rathcoole. These two parishes are now in a partnership, although not yet formally grouped. Please pray that under Colin's leadership, the two congregations may grow together numerically and spiritually.

A little closer to home, St Katharine's will soon have been vacant (that is, without a minister) for a year, and no decision has yet been taken about its future. The congregation continues to meet for worship each Sunday morning, often led by the Rev'd Canon Brian Courtney.

There are also ongoing conversations about St Paul & St Barnabas, led by the Curate-in-Charge, the Rev'd Andrew Irwin, as his initial three-year tenure is coming to an end.

Remembering also what is happening in the parishes in the north west of Belfast, it is evident that this is a time of significant change in the ecclesiastical landscape of the city. Would you please pray for Bishop George and Archdeacon Barry as they work with the clergy and select vestries throughout north Belfast and Newtownabbey.

NOBODY'S PERFECT

Look at this somewhat misleading verse from St Paul's Letter to the Philippians: "Brothers and sisters, join in imitating me, and observe those who live according to the example you have in us." In other words, "Do what I do, and do what the people who do what I do, do." Now, what's misleading about this, is that if you were a casual reader of the Bible, who read this passage out of context, then you might think that, if Paul is asking us to follow his example, then he must be a very good Christian. He must be a Christian worth emulating. But as we know, there is not a single human being alive or dead, who is perfect. There are plenty of people who we might think come close to perfection; there are plenty of people who want the world to think that they are perfect. But, in reality, nobody is.

Take for example, the case of Ruby Franke. This is a very recent news story, only from the last few years, and if you don't remember it from being on the news, then you will find some good documentaries about it on TV. Ruby Franke is an American woman, who, with her husband Kevin, has six children. The oldest today would be in their twenties, and the youngest in their teens.

Ruby Franke rose to fame about ten years as a Youtube sensation. She showed videos of her everyday family life, raising her six children. And she portrayed herself as the perfect mother. She was idolised by people all around the world; she was considered to

be "American's mom", and her Youtube videos were generating up to two million dollars a year for them. And then, it all came crashing down. Within five years of becoming famous as "the perfect mother", she had cut off contact with her two eldest children, and she began to torture her two youngest children (aged six and twelve at the time) in order to discipline them. This ended when her twelve year old son escaped and ran to a neighbour's house. He had duct tape tied to his wrists and ankles, and deep lacerations where he had been held down by rope. He was malnourished and emaciated.

The police discovered his younger sister in a similar condition, and their mother, Ruby Franke was charged with child abuse. She's now serving time in prison. It is a tragic example of how people who appear to be perfect are often (indeed always) imperfect.

But let's think about St Paul again. Was he perfect enough, to warrant him saying "Join in imitating me"? Well, the answer has to be "no". So, why would Paul say that? Well, this is where the verse today is misleading because we need to know what Paul had written prior to this, in order to make sense of it.

Look at what he wrote before that verse: "Whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ and be found in him." What Paul is talking about here are his past achievements. As a younger man, he had been a rising star within the Pharisees because of his strong intellect and religious zeal. And yet, now, as he reflects upon all of that, he realises that it was meaningless and that his only real achievement was in knowing Jesus Christ and, even then, that was Christ's achievement, and not Paul's own.

And then he writes: "Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on towards the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus."

It's after this, then, that he tells the Philippians to imitate him. So he isn't saying "Look at how wonderful I am. Be like me." He's saying, "Look at how I am trying hard to let Christ live through me. Now, you do the same."

So, despite all his sins, God achieved much through St Paul, in the same way that, despite all our own sins, God can achieve much through us. So, let's remember that we don't need to portray ourselves as perfect. Nor should we let anyone else try to fool us that they are perfect. Because it's never about us, and how good we are—our lives should be all about Jesus Christ, and how great he is.

AT THE FOOT OF THE CROSS

This poem by N.W. Palin was printed in the April 1935 issue of the St James' Parish Magazine.

Oh, Lamb of God! Thy Sacred Body torn, We see Thee hang upon Thy Cross of pain With pallid Lips, and Eyes so dimmed with blood Who nailed Thee there; who caused Thee to be slain? I stood beneath the Cross and gazed - and gazed Into those dying Eyes and then Methought Thou moved and looked into mine own. Until my soul was drawn from out myself, And lo, I stood at Calvary alone. And as I stood I saw the howling mob That hounded Him, the Lord of Life, to death, And heard the words of wondrous Love which fell From those pale Lips e'en with His ebbing Breath. And then methought I heard One speak to me "Ah, Child of Mine, have you no thought to see That 'twas for you I bore Mine Agony, And hung in bitter torture on the Tree. For you it was, as though none other lived, I shed My Blood that day on Calvary." I knelt beside the Cross and hid my face Beneath my hands; I did not dare to glance At that most Sacred Face so marred by pain, But prayed with heart now well-nigh breaking, that If it might be one Drop of Blood might chance To fall on me and wash away my stain, For now I knew that I with my self will Had helped that day to cause Him to be slain.

St Peter's Consort trip to Durham Cathedral

St Peter's church appeals to the senses in various ways; from the physical splendour of its architecture, to the more metaphysical - an atmosphere of Christian friendship and conviviality. One key element, of course, is music and, unlike stonework, glass or congregations, the fine Anglican choral tradition of St Peter's and St James' can be shared more widely through choir



trips. These may not be the easiest things to arrange and manage, but the benefits of sharing worship through music in farther-off places makes the effort and expense very worthwhile.

This year, some of our choristers visited Durham Cathedral for the first weekend of March, and with fine, sunny weather added to the sheer physical drama of the great cathedral itself, it was a truly enjoyable trip and greatly appreciated by the folk in Durham. They sang at three services, twice at choral evensong and once at the main morning Eucharist. Add to this several hefty rehearsals and stiff climbs up the hill from hotels to the cathedral and the result was a tired, but enthused and doubtless fitter choir – which we will all benefit from.

Four old friends of the choir joined for the weekend and the organist was none other than Andrew Scott, organist of St Michael and All Angels with St James, Croydon, and managing director of Harrison and Harrison, the firm which builds or repairs many of the most prestigious organs in the British Isles and overseas.

The social side of the trip really ought to be mentioned, though I must note the rule: what happens on a choir trip to Durham, stays in Durham! The choir members made their own way over by plane or boat and stayed in various establishments in the town, but when we got together, ribald good humour was the order of the day, and any dietary restrictions some might previously have held to were blown away in a Turkish restaurant on the Saturday night. Many coffee beans were ground, tea leaves dried and grapes trodden upon to keep the choir in tip-top form.

These trips, though occasional, are important, not just because they are fun and help build a sense of comradeship and cohesion amongst choir members, but because they are demanding of individual performances, pushing abilities harder and nurturing talent. As ever, we have to acknowledge the splendid efforts and leadership of Robert, choirmaster and all round good egg. The result, for me as a mere by-stander, was beautiful music echoing back from ancient stone work and disappearing into the vastness of the cathedral. Listening to members of our choir producing such sounds and our very own soloists hitting such extraordinary notes left me bursting with pride. As they processed out for the final time, Elgar's 'March Imperial' erupted from the organ and it seemed so appropriate.

Notes from the console

Back in the days when Norman Finlay was Director of Music in St Peter's he directed a choral ensemble called the St Peter's Consort ... made up of singers from the Parish and the wider musical community. I decided earlier this year to revive this concept for a weekend away to Durham Cathedral. For this visit the St Peter's Consort consisted of most members of our Parish Choir plus some invited singers ... two from Northern Ireland and two from as far apart and as far away as Arnhem in the Netherlands and London. I know David has written a lovely article in this month's magazine about the Consort's recent trip to Durham Cathedral but I just want to add a few reflections of my own. Obviously the social aspects of these events are of immense benefit to all concerned but to me the most significant factor is the opportunity to be ambassadors for Anglican church music in Ireland beyond this city and this island. In this the St Peter's Consort truly excelled themselves, both in the excellence of their music making and in the panache with which they fulfilled all the duties of a choir leading worship in one of the great cathedrals of the world. I was so proud of them all. We had so much positive feedback from clergy and members of the congregation but the words of one gentleman at coffee after the Sunday Eucharist stand out for me ... "We get so many great choirs here ... university chapel choirs, chamber choirs, parish choirs, other cathedral choirs and you are up there with any of them". How lovely was that!

In May we will be away again when we will travel to Worsley, near Manchester, to join with the Parish Choir of St Mark's for morning Eucharist on May 4th. Then in the afternoon we will sing Choral Evensong. St Mark's is a wonderful church designed by Sir Giles Gilbert Scott (of Liverpool Cathedral fame) and is, of course, where our own Jillian Collinson sings week by week. I have chosen all the music to have an Irish flavour ... Stanford, Wood, Moran, Drinkell. I'm sure this will be another most enjoyable weekend.

It is, of course, a treat to be away from time to time to time, but our principal duty is to lead the music week by week here in St Peter's and I cannot thank the Parish Choir enough for their hard work and dedication and all of you for your support and encouragement. There will be lots of fabulous music during Holy Week and over the next few months as we build up towards the celebration of St Peter's Day, which, in this special anniversary year falls, very


appropriately, on a Sunday (June 29th). The anthem that morning will be Bairstow's wonderful *Blessed City, Heavenly Salem ...* a musical tour de force in celebration of the building, the parish and its rich heritage.
















PAUSE FOR THOUGHT AND PRAYER

From the solemnity and soul-searching of Lent to the joy of Easter morning

These are purely my own thoughts: I think about the times when I have let people down, have not shown enough appreciation for a kindness to me, or taken it for granted; also, when I have said or done something I regret. Which is why I don't give up anything for Lent. Yes, I could give up sweets or treats, but as they feature vey little in my life that wouldn't be much of a sacrifice. Anyway, if I were no better a person at the end of Lent what would be the point of my public sacrifice/deprivation—I would feel I was a hypocrite. My greatest comfort comes from Saint Paul when he says in Romans, chapter 7, 'I do not do what I want, but I do the very things that I hate ... in fact it is no longer I who do it but sin that dwells within me For I do not do the good I want, but the evil I do not want ...'. Saint Paul goes on to say that no matter what we have done Jesus will forgive us if we acknowledge our sins and seek his forgiveness. We will be remembering Jesus' supreme sacrifice on Good Friday, the darkest day in the Christian year when he died in agony, suffocation, humiliation and degradation—in our place, for our sins—and then, the sheer joy of Easter morning as we celebrate his resurrection from the dead—church bells ringing, people singing alleluias and songs of thanksgiving and gladness.

> Heavenly Father, your son paid a terrible price for our redemption may we never, ever, take it or him for granted. Amen.
