#### **RECTOR'S NOTES**



#### **SERVICES IN MAY**

On Sunday 4<sup>th</sup> May, which is the **Third Sunday of Easter**, there will be a short, simple service at 10.30am, followed immediately by our annual meeting of the Easter Vestry. More information about the meeting is given a little later in these Notes.

On Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> May, which is the **Fourth Sunday of Easter**, there will be two services: Family Matins at 10.30am, and then Choral Evensong at 3.30pm.

On Sunday 18<sup>th</sup> May, which is the **Fifth Sunday of Easter**, there will Choral Eucharist at 10.30am.

On Sunday 25<sup>th</sup> May, which is the Sixth Sunday of Easter – more commonly known as **Rogation Sunday** – there will a service of Choral Matins at 10.30am.

Our midweek services continue at 10.30am on Wednesdays throughout the month, with the exception of the last week. <u>There will not be a service on Wednesday 28th May</u>. Instead, there will be a celebration of Holy Communion on Thursday 29th May, which is **Ascension Day**.

We will be celebrating only one Holy Day this month, which is **St Matthias' Day** on Wednesday 14<sup>th</sup> May.

#### **CHRISTIAN AID WEEK**

This year, Christian Aid Week begins on Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> May. Our parish coordinator for Christian Aid, Jill Bradley, will leave envelopes in the church that Sunday morning for anyone who would like to make a donation. Jill has written her own article about the work of Christian Aid, and you can read that a little further on in these Notes.

#### **EASTER GIFT BAGS**

Thank you to Ashlee McCune for preparing our Easter gift bags for the housebound (see front cover). They are always well-received and much appreciated.

#### **GENERAL SYNOD**

The General Synod is the supreme governing body of the Church of Ireland. Like a parliament, it consists of two "houses": The House of Bishops, which includes all serving Bishops, and the House of Representatives, which includes some clergy and laity from each of the dioceses. For any changes to be made, it must have the agreement of both the House of Bishops and the House of Representatives. The General Synod meets once a year for a few days. This year, it will meet in-person on Friday 9th May and Saturday 10th May, and then online during the subsequent week for any remaining business.

In addition to the reports and discussions of issues affecting the Church of Ireland, the specific matters to be resolved at this year's General Synod include:

- 1) Merging the General Synod representation from the formerly separate dioceses of Tuam, Killala, & Achonry, and Limerick & Killaloe.
- 2) Ensuring that representatives to Diocesan Synods are registered members of the parish(es) which they represent.
- 3) Maintaining consistency in the Constitution of the Church of Ireland by stating the retirement age of Archdeacons as 75 rather than 70.
- 4) Amending the governance arrangements of Christ Church Cathedral, Dublin.
- 5) Ensuring that incumbents sign and return an agreement to occupy a residence provided by the parish.
- 6) Amending how clergy pensions are calculated.
- 7) Increasing the number of co-opted members on the Representative Body from 11 to 18.

- 8) Merging the "Resident" and "Accustomed" membership registration forms into a single form.
- 9) Permitting electronic voting at in-person meetings of the General Synod.
- 10) Establishing a working group to consider whether clergy should be permitted to solemnise marriages in secular venues.
- 11) Mandating that each diocese hold a "Racial Justice Sunday" service on the second Sunday of February each year.
- 12) Removing the requirement that the membership of the Marriage Council includes a serving Bishop.

I would ask you, please, to remember the work of the General Synod in your prayers.

I am grateful to Dora Hanna for officiating at Choral Evensong on Palm Sunday, and Robert Long for officiating at Late Evening Office on Holy Tuesday, and to Sandra Hutchman for sharing "reading duties" with me on Good Friday. We give thanks also for our Organist & Choir Master, Robert Thompson, and our choir (see photo) for their beautiful musical ministry to us on Maundy



Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Day. And we must never forget our Parish Administrator, Anne Cromie, for preparing many orders of service, and our two Churchwardens, Daphne McClements and Margaret McKenna Black, for preparing the church for worship.

Thanks also to our Flowers Coordinator, Sandra Davison, and the team of volunteers who came to the church on Holy Saturday to arrange flowers and do a quick spring clean. The church looked really beautiful.

#### THE VENERABLE DR STEPHEN MCBRIDE

We were delighted to welcome a former rector, the Ven Dr Stephen McBride, to preach in St Peter's on Sunday 6th April. Stephen was the Rector of St Peter's from 1990 until 1995, succeeding Canon Will Harris, and preceding the Rev'd Charles McCollum. A native of north Belfast, he worshipped in our neighbouring parish of Holy Trinity in his youth. Since leaving



St Peter's, he has served as Vicar of Antrim Parish and as Archdeacon of Connor. Sadly, smoke damage to All Saints, Antrim, after Christmas has meant that his church needs major restoration work, and accordingly we presented Stephen with a cheque to help support them during this difficult time (see photo).

#### **EASTER VESTRY**

The annual meeting of registered members of the parish will be held in St Peter's at 10.30am on Sunday 4th May, immediately following a shorter-than-usual act of worship. However, God willing, neither of these two fears will come true! As this is the only such meeting we must have each year, could I please implore you to attend.

#### CAN YOU HEAR THE VOICE OF JESUS?

I recently watched an interview with a woman talking about baby sheep who are rejected by their mothers shortly after they are born. There are various reasons why these lambs are rejected: If the mother gave birth to more than one lamb, she may choose to focus on one of them, and neglect the other. Or if the lamb is born with a deformity, or if the lamb is unable to suckle properly. Or even if the lamb is otherwise perfectly fine, it may simply be that the mother is too ill or stressed to care for it.

Left to fend for themselves, these little lambs would die. To prevent this, the farmer takes these lambs and gives them special attention. They're kept in a warm, dry environment – in olden

days in the farmhouse with the farmer, who bottle feeds them, and handles them much more tenderly than they would with the other lambs who are thriving with their mothers out in the fields.

And because of this, these lambs form a deeper level of attachment to the farmer, than the others. They know they are safe with the farmer. They know the farmer's voice. And so once these lambs have been returned to the fields with the rest of the sheep, whenever the farmer goes out in the morning to call the sheep, it is the ones who know his voice, who come running over first.

Now, let's get religious. Let's imagine that each of us is a little lamb. And the world (or more specifically, society) is our mother. We depend upon the society in which we live to provide us with food, water, entertainment, protection, employment, education, and healthcare. And yet whilst there are a lot worse societies to live in than what we have created in the western world, there is no denying that our society is hanging together by a thread. The resources of this planet are not equally shared by all people; our healthcare system is at breaking point; and people are now so consumed with paying the bills and making ends meet, that there is very little time and energy left in the average worker's week to be involved in social groups and organisations (including the Church).

As mother's go, our society is not a very good one. And many people are finding themselves increasingly isolated, unvalued and uncared for. We are, for all intents and purposes, like those little lambs who have been abandoned by their mother.

God, however, through his Holy Spirit, does not leave us abandoned. In John's Gospel, we read that Jesus, preparing his disciples for his death, told them "I will not leave you orphans. I will come to you." And that, of course, is what the Holy Spirit is. He is God who comes to us. And like the farmer taking the rejected sheep into his home to care for it, so too does God the Holy Spirit seek to nurture us, to help us grow, to feel protected,

to feel valued, and to be prepared for the difficulties of life out in the world.

And when we have that intimate relationship with God, when we recognise our dependence upon him, and not upon the world which cares so little for us, we learn to recognise God's voice. We learn to distinguish his voice calling out to us, from the other noises in the world which try to drown him out. And because we have experienced his love for us, we run to him whenever he calls.

That's the voice that Mary Magdalene heard that Sunday morning as she stood weeping in the garden, beside the tomb from which the body of Jesus had vanished. Since the death of Jesus on the Cross on the Friday, she must have felt the deep pain of grief – now compounded by the seeming removal of Jesus' body which she had come to anoint. And so she stands in the garden, overwhelmed by emotion. And a voice nearby says, "Woman, why are you weeping? Who are you looking for?" And Mary, thinking the voice to be that of the gardener, asks if he knows where Jesus has been taken. And the voice replies, "Mary". That's all, just her name. And it was enough for her to recognise that the voice belonged to Jesus himself.

My question for you is whether you recognise the voice of Jesus saying your name? Can you hear him over the clamour of the world with all its problems? Can you hear him calling, "Come to me, all who are weary and heavy laden, and I will refresh you?" And I know that the difficulties of life can often make us feel like Mary Magdalene in the garden, feeling overwhelmed – perhaps even feeling that the God in whom we had put our trust is gone. But even though she could not see him, he was there. And when she heard him call her name, she recognised him.

The voice of Jesus was kind, and compassionate, and forgiving. That's the same voice which is calling you, today and everyday. Can you hear him? Do you recognise him? And will you come to him when he calls your name?

#### **Christian Aid**

80 years of service to the vulnerable, the needy and hungry and the oppressed

On Saturday 15th March, Jill Bradley, our Christian Aid rep, and I attended an excellent conference in Carnmoney Presbyterian Church Hall celebrating the 80th anniversary of the founding of Christian Aid. After a warm welcome and introduction to Christian Aid Week, we attended two workshops, one on fundraising where we shared ideas on successful ways of raising funds and the other on Guatemala which was addressed by Gerardo Tobar. He told us about the severe problems the people face such as dangerously high temperatures—42 degrees centigrade; excessive palm planting thus losing valuable native trees which provided the people with nutritious seeds and berries as well as some which are medicinal, but 'big businesss' leaders are too powerful and it is hard to fight them. There is drought as well as heavy rain, and when the land is iron hard the rain runs away instead of into the parched earth—the water table is reduced causing great difficulty for the farmers. But the people, with the help of Christian Aid, are fighting back to make their land viable with ways of conserving water with small dams and protecting the young crops with leaves to keep the moisture in. We heard about Aurelia, a farmer and community leader who helps the people make best use of the land with Christian Aid partner Congcoop. Extreme weather is ravaging the farms of the indigenous (Mayan) communities and Amelia, a young woman whose banana trees were destroyed by the weather, is training with Congcoop and is beginning to grow resilient crops to fight the effects of the climate crisis.

After a lunch of tasty sandwiches and sausage rolls, tea and coffee, we went away very impressed by the on-going work of Christian Aid.

#### A potted history of Christian Aid

Christian Aid was set up in 1945 to respond to the refugee crisis after the Second World War. It was established to tackle both the symptoms and root causes of poverty and injustice, challenging the systems and structures that keep people powerless, marginalised and vulnerable. The understanding of the Christian faith is informed by Jesus coming to rescue a world in need. Luke records in Acts 4: 34-35, "There were no needy persons among them. For from time to time those who owned land or houses sold them, brought money from the sales and put it at the apostles' feet, and it was distributed to anyone who had need." The apostle James

(James 2: 15-17) urged believers to nurture the kind of faith that leads to practical action, such as providing for those without clothes and daily food. He goes on to argue that faith which is not accompanied by action is dead.

Christian Aid co-operates with churches as natural partners but also works with people and agencies of all faiths and none who side with the poor. "... we believe that despite holding different views, churches should be united in the belief that all people are equal in God's sight .... It is for this reason that Christian Aid works with partner organisations which defend the human rights of LGBTQ+ people." (Information from 'Why Christian Aid Ireland?')

'Hope is an unstoppable force. Hope unites us. Hope fuels action. Hope makes change possible.' With our help we can give people hope.

#### Feeling stressed?

Have you noticed that you instinctively feel better when spending time in gardens or nature? This positive feeling has been confirmed by scientific research: A study by Mental Health Foundation into "Mental Health and Nature" found that how much we notice, think about and appreciate our natural surroundings can be critical for supporting good mental health.

Doing some gardening is a good example of this as it helps release seratonin and endorphins which are our body's natural feel-good hormones that promote mental wellbeing. Research also shows we can concentrate better after spending time in or looking at nature and so gardening can have a powerful and positive impact for people with a range of mental health needs.

#### Now you can sense what's coming ...!!

Would you be able to help us by doing some light gardening to help keep our church grounds neat and tidy? Maybe just a bit of weeding, some brushing, and a general tidy up? I'm sure we all appreciate our beautiful surroundings at St Peter's but obviously it all takes some looking after. Several volunteers giving about 30 minutes every fortnight or so from April to October would make a huge difference in keeping everything looking good. All you would need is a trowel, a bucket and a kneeler—there is a brown bin available in the grounds for weeds etc. You could come any time that suits you, and you could bring as many helpers as you like!!

When you garden with others, the benefits are huge. It gives a sense of belonging, of being part of something, and it helps combat social isolation. Go on, give it a go!  $_{AC}$
