SERVICES IN JULY AND AUGUST

Sunday 6th July is the **Third Sunday after Trinity**. There will be a celebration of Holy Communion at 10.30am.

Sunday 13th July is the **Fourth Sunday after Trinity**. There will be a service of Morning Prayer at 10.30am.

Sunday 20th July is the **Fifth Sunday after Trinity**. There will be a celebration of Holy Communion at 10.30am.

Sunday 27th July is the festival of **St James the Apostle** (transferred from 25th July). There will be a Form One (Middle English language) service of Morning Prayer at 10.30am. Following this service, we will have a barbecue and bouncy castles in the halls.

Sunday 3rd August is the **Seventh Sunday after Trinity**. There will be a celebration of Holy Communion at 10.30am, at which the Rev'd Clifford Skillen will celebrate and preach.

Sunday 10th August is the **Eighth Sunday after Trinity**. There will be a service of Morning Prayer at 10.30am.

Sunday 17th August is the **Ninth Sunday after Trinity**. There will be a celebration of Holy Communion at 10.30am.

Sunday 24th August is the festival of **St Bartholomew**. There will be a Service of the Word at 10.30am.

Sunday 31st August is the **Eleventh Sunday after Trinity**. There will be a Healing Service at 10.30am.

There will be services at 10.30am every **Wednesday** throughout July and August. These will normally be Holy Communion, but on a couple of occasions this may be changed to Morning Prayer, depending on holidays.

LEAFLET DELIVERY

On Monday 16th June, a team of volunteers ventured out into the streets around St Peter's to deliver leaflets. One was a religious tract designed to encourage people to think about Jesus, and to consider exploring their faith in St Peter's. The other was an invitation card to our St Peter's Day service.

Leafleting is very much a scatter-gun approach to getting the word out, as it relies on a leaflet being delivered to the right person at the right place at the right time, in order to elicit a positive response. Out of five hundred leaflets delivered, it might result in only one person coming along to St Peter's. Even so, I'd say it was worth it for that one person.

HOUSE GROUP

Even if you have never been involved in one, I'm sure many of you will be aware of small groups of Christians who meet together formally perhaps once a month to talk with each other, to pray with each other, and to work through some light discussion material relating to the Christian faith. Some churches call these "house groups" or "cell groups" or something similar. How these groups operate depends very much on the intentions behind them, and the needs and personalities of their members - and these will change over time. So, as we begin to explore how house groups could work within the context of St Peter's, I'm going to bring together four or five people to act as guinea pigs. Importantly, this group is something that I will guide and support, but I will not be a member of it.

If you are interested in being a member of this test group during the remainder of the year, please let me know. If you and a few others (again, no more than five in total) would voluntarily like to get together to form your own house group, let me know and I will work with you.

NI CHILDREN'S HOSPICE

Thank you to everyone who donated to our loose plate collections at our Family Services throughout the academic year. The purpose was to let the children be involved in collecting money for charity, and that's why I have always asked simply for any spare change that you have had. Needless to say, however, I am absolutely delighted that the congregation has generously raised £1,000 for the NI Children's Hospice. This was presented to Jackie (*see front cover*) who volunteers for the Hospice, at our Family Service on Sunday 1st June.

PRAYER LIST

Going forward, I will leave a box at the back of St Peter's into which you can leave prayer requests. There will be some pens and paper beside the box, but you may of course write a prayer request at home and bring it with you. It is very fitting, therefore, that Annette has presented a rhododendron bush to grow in the grounds of the church, in memory of Noel. That bush, which was kindly planted by another of our green-fingered parishioners – Garnet Maguire, is at the southeast corner of the south transept, about halfway between the church porch and the entrance to the halls.

Especially over the summer months, we really need parishioners to volunteer to help maintain the grounds. If you have some free time and want to help, please take the initiative to do whatever simple tasks need to be done. This primarily includes cutting the grass, or litter picking, or removing vegetation from the edges of the tarmac, or weeding. You might also like to clear out the drains if you feel adventurous enough! We're very grateful to Daryl Meldrum for cutting the grass in recent weeks, and would be delighted to see more people helping out in similar ways.

DEPUTY CHURCHWARDENS

A couple of months ago at our Easter Vestry, I re-appointed Daphne McClements as my Churchwarden, but announced that other parishioners would be invited to step into that role on a rota basis over the course of this year, in order to prepare for Daphne's Having served as People's at Easter 2026. retirement Churchwarden (1987 to 1996) and as Rector's Churchwarden (2012 until now) she has been an exemplary servant of the Church. Sadly, for reasons best left to Daphne to disclose, her mobility has become limited, and a rota of Deputy Churchwardens is now being prepared more quickly than anticipated. Going forward, you will see various parishioners standing at the back of the church when you arrive. God willing, Daphne will be there too, doing whatever she feels able to, and it will be lovely having her back amongst us.

DOES GOD WANT YOU TO THINK AGAIN?

There were a couple of days in April when social media was full of stories relating to the anniversary of the sinking of the Titanic. One story that caught my attention was this:

One of the engineers who worked down in the engine room of the ship took an interest in looking after the ship's cat. I don't know whether ships still have cats on board, but it was common in the past-the cats would catch the rodents on ships that might otherwise get into the food supplies. According to the story I read, the Titanic had its own cat on board. The cat was pregnant and lived down in the bowels of the ship, in the warmth of the engine room where huge coal fires powered the steam turbines. Presumably, she boarded the ship in Belfast, but by the time Titanic reached Southampton, she had given birth to a litter of kittens. The story goes that the engineer who had been caring for the cat saw her carry her kittens-one by one-down the gangway and off the ship. Convinced that her instincts meant something was wrong, he followed her example and disembarked. Titanic set sail without him or the cat and her kittens. And the rest, as they say, is history.

Now, while it's an established fact that the Titanic sank, there is no evidence at all to support this tale of the engineer and the prophetic cat. Even if it's not true—and I suspect it isn't—it's not the only time someone has changed course based on a feeling or hunch, and avoided disaster as a result. You might be familiar with a horror film series called "Final Destination". The premise is that people cheat death by making last-minute changes of plan, only for death to come after them in increasingly elaborate ways. The first film begins with a student boarding a plane for a school trip to France. As the rest of the passengers settle in, he suddenly has a vision—an overwhelming certainty—that the plane will explode. He insists on getting off, and a few others join him. From the airport, they watch the plane take off and then explode. That's fiction, of course. But the idea that people sometimes feel compelled not to do something—and that such gut instincts occasionally save lives—is not beyond the realm of real experience. Think of the recent news story about a woman in Australia who was accused of poisoning her former in-laws with a dinner laced with toxic mushrooms. Her ex-husband survived only because he changed his mind at the last minute and decided not to attend. A small, intuitive change of plan saved his life.

That brings us to the moment in the Acts of the Apostles when St Paul changes his course of action. The passage reads: "Paul and Timothy went through the region of Phrygia and Galatia, having been forbidden by the Holy Spirit to speak the word in Asia. When they had come opposite Mysia, they attempted to go into Bithynia, but the Spirit of Jesus did not allow them ...". (Acts 16)

Paul wanted to preach the gospel in Asia, but was told "no." He tried to go into Bithynia, but again, the answer was "no." The text is clear that these prohibitions came from the Holy Spirit. What's unclear is how the Spirit communicated them. Was it a gut feeling? Was there a prophetic vision? Did someone else have a word from God for Paul? Or was Paul himself being prophetic—reading the situation, recognising real dangers or closed hearts, and discerning that the mission would not bear fruit there?

Whatever way the guidance came, Paul clearly understood it to be divine, and he changed his plans accordingly. And that change led him to a new encounter—with Lydia, a wealthy woman who embraced Christianity and supported Paul in his mission.

The challenge for us, then, is to consider when *we* might be called to change course. Sometimes we get our hearts so set on doing something—even for seemingly good and noble reasons—that we stop listening for whether God might want to lead us in a different direction. But being a Christian is not just about living by the values of Jesus; it's about being led by Jesus.

So if you are pressing forward with something in your life—some long-held plan, a bold ambition, or even something that feels right and good—take a moment to ask: is this what Jesus wants me to do? Or is it simply what I want to do?

And then, be attentive. God may guide you with clear signs ... or subtle whispers. And if you sense that He is telling you to change direction—will you be willing, like Paul, to obey?

PAUSE FOR THOUGHT AND PRAYER by Rosemary Johnston

St James the Great; Camino; Sad Endings and New Beginnings

No doubt all of you will know that we first come across Saint James not long after Jesus begins his ministry and is walking by the Sea of Galilee. There he calls Simon Peter and his brother, Andrew, to follow him. Then he sees James and his brother. John. sons of Zebedee, and calls them also. All four immediately leave their nets and follow Jesus, leaving behind their families. What the families thought is not recorded, but there must have been something so compelling about Jesus that the men were ready to leave their fairly stable livelihood and families behind and follow this stranger into an uncertain future. But this they did, even though we know they did not fully understand all Jesus said and did. Peter, James and John appear to be the 'inner circle' among the disciples, accompanying Jesus up the mountain when he was transfigured; when Simon's mother-in-law is healed and when Jairus' daughter is restored to life. But James and John are rebuked when they ask to sit at either side of Jesus, who explains that 'it is God who will give places to those for whom he has prepared them'. Later Jesus tells Peter, James, John and Andrew about what will happen in the future—wars, earthquakes, famine and more. They are to be on guard. They will suffer but they must spread the Good News to all peoples. Peter, James and John accompanied Jesus to the Garden of Gethsemane, but they fell asleep and were only wakened when the crowd, led by the chief priests arrived to arrest Jesus. James was with the other disciples when they drew lots to choose someone to replace Judas. (They chose Matthias.) It is believed James travelled to Spain and carried out missionary work there for a time, but he returned to Jerusalem where Herod Agrippa had him put to death by the sword. Which brings me to the Camino de Santiago de Compostela. It is believed Saint James' disciples carried his remains back to Galicia in NW Spain where he was buried and in the 9th century a chapel was constructed which evolved into the Santiago Cathedral. This sparked a surge in Christian pilgrims seeking spiritual solace, and the Camino became a major pilgrimage route in the Middle ages. Pilgrims collect

yellow scallop shells as proof of their journey and the scallop shell has become the symbol of the route. Pilgrams must walk the last 100km or cycle 200km to get their certificate. "Some of the bells that once hung in the basilica of Santiago de Compostela in NW Spain-still visited by Catholic pilgrims from all over the world—spent over 200 years in a mosque. The bells were plundered from the Apostol Basilica in Santiago after Arabs captured the city in AD997. The Arabs forced Christian prisoners to carry the bells more than 500 miles across the country to the great mosque of Cordoba. The bells were set upside down and used as lamps. In 1236, after the Spanish recaptured Cordoba, King Ferdinand III made Moorish prisoners carry the bells all the way back. Since then, the bells have vanished from the church and from history, and their fate is unknown. The church does, however, still contain the world's largest censer, which is about 4ft high, and swings across the nave on a large rope from the roof. Eight men are required to keep it swinging."

Endings and beginnings. Years ago there were many Church of Ireland churches in north Belfast. Sadly, that is no longer the case, and none of us can be certain what tomorrow may bring. When St James' church (named after that apostle) closed in 2008, some of the parishioners joined us here in St Peter's and we have become one church family—no 'us and them', but they must have felt a great sense of loss and hurt at having to leave their own well-loved church, home for so many years. Some of those who have joined us in recent months from other parishes may feel that same sense of pain and loss but we hope they know they are welcome here and that, in time, they come to feel at home with us. When we kneel at the rails in the sanctuary during Holy Communion to receive the bread and wine, we do it together as fellow Christians, and afterwards when we gather together to have a cup of tea or coffee, we do it together in fellowship and friendship. We are the people of God going forward together because "We being many are one body, for we all share in the one bread".

Heavenly Father: We give you thanks for the witness and missionary work of Saint James. May we too be witnesses for the Good News and know, like Peter, that in these uncertain and dangerous times there is nowhere else to turn but to you, and that you will be with us always. Amen.
