RECTOR'S NOTES



SERVICES IN OCTOBER

Sunday 5th October is the Sixteenth Sunday after Trinity. There will be a choral celebration of the Eucharist at 10.30am.

Sunday 12th October is our Harvest Thanksgiving. Our Family Service will be in the morning at 10.30am, and there will be Choral Evensong at 3.30pm. We would appreciate donations of fruit, vegetables, and flowers to decorate the church on the morning of Saturday 11th October. Please bring whatever you can to St Peter's between 10am and 11.30am that day, thank you.

Sunday 19th October is the Eighteenth Sunday after Trinity. There will be a choral celebration of the Eucharist at 10.30am.

Sunday 26th October is Bible Sunday. There will be a Service of the Word at 10.30am. Our guest preacher will be the Rev'd Dr Alan McCormack. Alan was once a chorister in St Peter's, and is currently the Dean of Goodenough College in London.

Throughout the month, there will be celebrations of Holy Communion at 10.30am every Wednesday. We will be continuing our exploration of the Books of the Bible: Deuteronomy (1st October), Joshua (8th October), Judges (15th October), and Ruth (22nd October). Note that on the last Wednesday of each month, we use the old-language version of Holy Communion, during which there is no sermon.

BIBLE STUDY

We have two Bible Study groups in St Peter's. One meets fortnightly on Thursday evenings, and the other meets monthly on a Wednesday morning. Both groups are open to anyone who is interested. No preparation is necessary; you do not need to bring anything with you, and there's no homework!

Bible Fellowship is the fancy name we use for the Thursday evening group. We meet in the Minor Hall on the second and fourth Thursdays of the month, which will be the 9th and 23rd October, from 7.30pm until 9pm. We are currently reading through the Book of Exodus.

Our monthly group meets after the mid-week celebration of Holy Communion on the last Wednesday morning of each month, although you are not obliged to join us for communion beforehand. We meet from 11.30am until 12.30pm in the Minor Hall.

DISCIPLESHIP GROUP

Our Discipleship Group meets once a month to discuss and learn about aspects of theology, ecclesiology, evangelism, or Christian living. In September, we thought about "Who is Jesus?" and examined the historical person, the theological mystery, and the living presence. This month, on Thursday 2nd October, we will be exploring the history, content, and meaning of Holy Communion within an Anglican context. If that is something you might be interested in learning about, then please do come along. We meet from 7.30pm until 9pm in the Minor Hall.

VOLUNTEERS FOR SUNDAY SCHOOL

May I appeal, please, for adult volunteers to help with our Sunday School on a rota basis. There are two ways to help: either by leading (using printed material produced weekly by a Christian organisation called ROOTS), or by simply being present in the halls to help supervise the children in accordance with our safeguarding policies. Please speak to me about helping in either way.

TEA/COFFEE ROTA

Thank you to everyone who has been preparing our Sunday morning refreshments. This is a very important ministry as it gives us an opportunity to chat together after each service. I am grateful to Sandra Hutchman for coordinating the rota, and I am certain that she would appreciate more volunteers. We only need one or two people each Sunday. All you need to do is bring a 2 litre bottle of milk and perhaps some biscuits (although we often already have plenty in the kitchen!). Everything else you need is provided, and there are always people on hand to assist or advise. The rota is on the noticeboard beside the south porch door. Please sign up for any free Sunday that suits you.

BEREAVEMENT GROUP

Our new monthly Bereavement Group met at midday on Wednesday 10th September. I have entrusted this ministry to Dora Hanna (see front cover), whose quiet, caring, and calming presence lends itself to this compassionate service. During the forty-five minutes, we prayed using a special liturgy for those who are bereaved, and then everyone lit a candle in memory of our loved ones. We finished with a short, informal discussion about grief and how it affects us.

Our next meeting will be on Wednesday 8th October at midday in St Peter's. Whether you have been bereaved for a few weeks or many years, you will be very welcome to join us. May I make a special appeal for those whose grief is still raw to come along. This group is very much intended to help you, and there will be no judgement over tears shed.

PRAYER GROUP

Our Prayer Group met for about half an hour on Wednesday 17th September. We began by offering our thanks to God, and then brought before him our needs and the needs of the world. Our next meeting will be at midday on Wednesday 15th October in St Peter's.

I am acutely aware that even the most articulate, intelligent people sometimes feel overwhelmed when asked to pray aloud with others. If that resonates with you, I don't want you to avoid the Prayer Group for fear of needing to say something. I will, as gently as possible, find ways of encouraging everyone to be involved, but it is absolutely fine if you wish to pray silently.

GUEST PREACHERS

We had two guest preachers during September. On Sunday 7th September, the **Rev'd Adrian Dorrian** made the journey from County Donegal with his wife, Anne. As many of you will remember, Adrian was the sixth rector of St Peter's (and second rector of St Peter & St James combined), serving for two and a half years from 2009 until 2012. He subsequently served for a short time as rector of St Mark's. Dundely



short time as rector of St Mark's, Dundela, before becoming Team Vicar of the Lecale group of parishes. Earlier this year he was instituted as Rector of Conwal and Gartan.

On Sunday 21st September, we were joined by the **Rev'd Nathan Ervine**. In 2017, Nathan was our Children's and Families' Worker in St Peter's, before heading to the Church of Ireland Theological Institute. Following his ordination in 2020, he served as Curate Assistant in St Nicholas', Carrickfergus, and is now the Minister of the joint Church of Ireland and Methodist congregation of the Church of the Good Shepherd in Monkstown.



DONATIONS NEEDED

The **Blythswood Shoe Box Appeal** brings warmth, joy, and practical support to those in need across Eastern Europe. Last year, over 85,000 shoeboxes were sent to Albania, Bulgaria, Hungary, Kosovo, Moldova, Romania, Serbia, and Ukraine, and since1993, the Appeal has delivered more than 2.8 million boxes, each one filled with love and care. Packed with items such as toiletries, stationery, and clothing, these gifts have reached

schools, hospitals, orphanages, care homes, and families living in hardship—including many affected by the war in Ukraine. This year, our parish is once again taking part—and volunteers are needed. You will find instructions elsewhere in these Parish Notes.

The Welcome Organisation provides vital support to people experiencing homelessness in Belfast. Their work depends on the generosity of the public—donating food, clothing, toiletries, and other essentials to help those in crisis. Items currently needed include: coffee, sugar, spaghetti hoops, baked beans, pot noodles, instant noodles, cuppa soups, cereal, crackers, biscuits, canned potatoes, tinned vegetables, spam, corned beef, pasta sauces, tuna, tinned fruit, ravioli, hot dogs (tinned or jar), butter (small/large), jam, peanut butter, chocolate spread, custard portions, bottled water, gravy mix. They are also appealing for deodorants, shampoo, conditioner, razors, shaving foam, shower gel, toothpaste, toothbrushes, sleeping bags, bath towels, disposable cups, mugs. Please note that they are not currently accepting duvets, blankets, tents, furniture, or clothing in large sizes.

The **North Belfast Foodbank** provides emergency food to individuals and families in crisis. Through donations from schools, churches, businesses, and the wider community, non-perishable food is gathered, sorted by volunteers, and distributed across two local centres in north Belfast. Referrals come via trusted agencies such as Surestarts, Wellbeing Centres, Citizen's Advice, and health professionals, and clients then redeem foodbank vouchers for three days' worth of supplies. Each food parcel contains breakfast cereals, soup, pasta, rice, pasta sauce, tinned beans, tinned meat, tinned vegetables, tinned fruit, tea or coffee, biscuits, and snacks. At the moment, they particularly need long life orange juice, UHT milk (1 litre), rice pudding and custard, tinned fish, dried 'smash' potatoes, and snacks.

Thank you for your generosity—and for helping us bring hope to others. Your donations can be left at the back of the church. Please ask a Churchwarden if you need help.

Pause for Thought and Prayer

Protest

People have always protested, possibly since Adam and Eve were told not to eat of the tree of Good and Evil. Well, we know how that all went. Thrown out of the Garden of Eden, where we could have been so happy, we are reaping what we sowed and have complained and protested ever since. In the 19th century we had the Peterloo massacres in Manchester where 60,000 protested about industrialisation, which was leading to job losses, and also the right to vote—only wealthy landowners could vote at that time. Then we had the Suffragettes wanting rights for women. They were the militant arm of the Women's Social and Political Union (WSPU) and were led by Emmiline Pankhurst. They used aggressive tactics and caused damage to property. Women did get the vote in 1918 but are still fighting for equal rights. Others protest about young people unable to buy or rent property in their own area because of second homeowners. Now we have people protesting about the awful happenings in Gaza. Some protest peacefully with no other agenda than to get their views known without causing trouble. Others are more militant and are prepared to take violent action, including damage to property or blocking roads causing great disruption. There are those (apparently peace-loving, non-violent people) who support them and end up being arrested. The attention during these more militant protests has been on the actions of the perpetrators instead of on the suffering Palestinians in Gaza, and I often wonder if those carrying out the protests consider that. How much will their actions help, or possibly hinder, the ongoing work to resolve the never ending war in that beleaguered country—or will it make any difference?

We are so fortunate to live in a society where peaceful protest is allowed. Think of the many countries around the world—eg Iran, some South American countries, Russia etc—where people are attacked by the security forces, imprisoned in harsh conditions, 'disappeared', or meet a suspicious death, such as falling out of a window. The following quote is from a recent article on protests in the Belfast Telegraph written by Malachi O'Doherty: 'It brings out the best in some and the worst in others. "Bliss was in that dawn to be alive," said Wordsworth of the French Revolution, not knowing at the time how it would end.

'If you are going to risk tearing a country apart, it would be as well to have the right cause and a vision of how things might be better afterwards.'

Heavenly Father, when we exercise our right to protest, help us to think carefully about the possible consequences of our actions. May we never take our precious freedom to protest peacefully for granted, and may we never abuse that freedom by the use of extreme violence which can focus on the violence rather than on the problem. Amen.




Please read the enclosed leaflet and take part in this very worthwhile project. Boxes may be left at the back of the church or at the parish office or you can have your shoebox collected at a mutually convenient time by ringing David Cromie, tel 9077 5669 or mob 07547 510698. Shoeboxes need to be with us by Sunday 9th November, please.



FIND AND WRAP

Choose an average-sized shoebox and decide whether it's for a child, teenager, man or woman. Wrap the box and lid separately so the lid can be removed without tearing the paper. If your box has an attached lid, cut the lid off, wrap separately and tape back on.





PACK AND CHECK

Fill the box with useful, long-lasting items.
Remove any unnecessary packaging to save space and reduce waste. Use the checklist to ensure you've included the recommended items, then tick them off and tape the checklist to the outside of the box.





DONATE AND DELIVER

Help cover transport and other costs by donating online or by using the donation envelope — place it on top of the items inside the box. Secure the lid with rubber bands (not tape) so that the contents can be inspected. Deliver your box to a local collection point (such as a church or school) by the end of October or the start of November for Christmas delivery.

- Toy*/gift
 - *Small toy for children such as cars, dolls, balls, etc. Please only include new shop-bought toys.
- Sweets

No chocolate, split multipacks, or any other food items. No loose sweets, lollies, or undated bags of sweets. Best before date no earlier than 31st March next year.

Do not include used or damaged items: war-related items such as toy guns, knives, or military figures; mouthwash; seeds; hand-made or knitted stuffed toys; chocolate or any food other than sweets. Chocolate eclairs and chocolate limes are not allowed; books that are mainly words should not be included.


