RECTOR'S NOTES



SERVICES IN DECEMBER AND JANUARY

Would parishioners make every effort to join us for worship in St Peter's either on Christmas Eve at 10.30pm, or Christmas Day at 10.30am.

On **Sunday 7th December**, which is the *Second Sunday of Advent*, there will be a choral celebration of Holy Communion at 10.30am.

On **Sunday 14th December**, which is the *Third Sunday of Advent*, there will be a choral service of Morning Prayer at 10.30am, which will include Christingles, and then a service of Choral Evensong at 3.30pm.

On **Sunday 21**st **December**, which is the *Fourth Sunday of Advent*, our Nativity Service will be at 10.30am. To give children time to dress up, could parents please bring them to church for no later than 10.15am.

On **Monday 22nd December**, our traditional service of *Nine Lessons & Carols* will be at 7.30pm.

On **Wednesday 24th December**, which is *Christmas Eve*, there will be a traditional choral celebration of Holy Communion at 10.30pm. Note that there will not be a morning service on this day.

On **Thursday 25**th **December**, which is the Principal Holy Day of *Christmas*, there will be a celebration of Holy Communion at 10.30am. For the benefit of anyone who needs to leave ovens switched on to cook their turkey, we will aim to conclude the service no later than 11.15am. Christmas is one of the three most important Principal Holy Days, alongside Easter and Pentecost, on which all Christians are called to join together in giving thanks to God. Could I please encourage everyone to do all they can to worship in St Peter's on this important day.

On **Sunday 28**th **December**, which is the festival of the *Holy Innocents*, there will be a service of Morning Prayer at 10.30am.

On **Sunday 4**th **January**, which is the Principal Holy Day of the *Epiphany*, there will be a celebration of Holy Communion at 10.30am. Our guest celebrant and preacher will be the Rev'd Clifford Skillen.

On **Sunday 11th January**, which is the *First Sunday after the Epiphany*, there will be a choral service of Morning Prayer at 10.30am. Note that there will not be a service of Choral Evensong on this day.

On **Sunday 18th January**, which is the *Second Sunday after the Epiphany*, there will be a choral celebration of Holy Communion at 10.30am.

On **Sunday 25**th **January**, which is the festival of the *Conversion of Saint Paul*, there will be a choral service of Morning Prayer at 10.30am, during which the entire congregation will renew the baptismal vows.

Throughout the two months, there will be celebrations of Holy Communion in the side chapels of the church **every** **Wednesday** at 10.30am. There are three exceptions to this: on Wednesday 24th December (Christmas Eve) there will not be a service in the morning, and instead there will be a service that night at 10.30pm. On both Wednesday 31st December and Wednesday 7th January, there will be services of Morning Prayer instead of Holy Communion.

Our mid-week service on Wednesday 10th December will take the form of a "**Blue Christmas**" service (including Holy Communion) at which we will reflect upon the joys of Christmas within the context of grief. This service will replace our December meeting of the Bereavement Group. If you miss a loved one, and feel that the usual festive services might be too much for you, then please do join us at this quieter, reflective service at 10.30am.

BLYTHSWOOD SHOEBOX APPEAL

Thank you to everyone who returned filled shoeboxes in recent weeks. Your act of generosity will help people living in eastern Europe – including in Albania, Hungary, Moldova, Romania, Serbia, Kosovo, and Ukraine. The shoeboxes are distributed schools, hospitals, orphanages, care homes, and low-income households, helping children, the elderly, and families affected by war, economic hardship, or social isolation. Could I please encourage anyone who is grieving to come along. The Bereavement Group will resume in its usual format at midday on Wednesday 14th January.

Our **Prayer Group** will meet at midday on both Wednesday 17th December and Wednesday 21st January.

CLERGY CONFERENCE

Once every three years, the clergy from Connor Diocese meet up in some far-flung hotel for forty-eight hours. The name "Clergy Conference" might mislead you into thinking that we spend our time debating the great issues of the day, but it is much more



like a spiritual retreat. There are regular Bible Studies, but also some time to relax and socialise with each other. This year, by coincidence, the clergy from Armagh Diocese were staying at the same hotel, and we were therefore able to catch up with colleagues that we might not often encounter.

Leading our Bible Study was Professor Peter Ford (see photo inset), who is Regius Professor Emeritus of Divinity at the University of Cambridge. He is a passionate enthusiast for the Gospel of John, and he has in fact recently published a book called "Meeting God in John".

In addition, the Rev'd Dr John Dunlop joined us to talk about his life and ministry, especially with regard to reconciliation. He mentioned St Peter's in his talk, reflecting upon ecumenical relationships in north Belfast when he was the Minister of Rosemary Presbyterian Church on the North Circular Road.

BIBLICAL INSPIRATION AND INTERPRETATION

The Bible is more than a single book. It is a library of sacred texts which were written and edited over many centuries by many people, and which have been interpreted by many generations of believers seeking to apply its teachings to their own time. Most Christians believe that God himself was somehow involved in the writing of these ancient texts. We call that involvement "inspiration". But what does it mean in practice when we say that the Bible was "inspired by God"?

I imagine that most people would assume it means "God wrote the Bible". We hear this in Church after the Bible is read, when the person reading declares "This is the Word of the Lord." But, perhaps surprisingly for a lot of Christians, there is a range of understanding within the Christian Church about the mechanics of how God was involved.

The first is "Verbal Plenary Inspiration", in which it is believed that every word in the Bible was specifically chosen by God to be written down. The human authors therefore simple wrote what they were told to write. Proponents of this belief tend to believe in "Biblical Inerrancy", in which the Bible is factually correct in every way (including, for example, six-day creation) or "Biblical Infallibility", in which the moral and doctrinal teachings of the Bible are free from error.

The second is "Dynamic Inspiration", in which God gave the human authors a general sense of what he wanted to communicate, but those authors chose their own words. Proponents of this belief tend to be interested in the original context in which the books of the Bible were written. They

recognise that the Holy Spirit was at work, but they also acknowledge the human beings through which the Spirit worked, and are keen to learn about the background, intentions, and audience of those original authors so that they can better understand the texts.

The third and fourth are the "Illumination View" and the "Neo-Orthodox View", which have nuanced differences, but for the sake of simplicity we can lump together. Essentially, they say that regardless of who wrote it, God the Holy Spirit is active when someone reads the Bible, and he is able to use the text to communicate something of himself to the reader. The focus here is less on how the Bible came to be written, and more on how God can use the Bible today.

The fifth is "Non-Theistic Perspectives", which deny that God had any involvement in the Bible, and that it was made entirely by humans. It therefore tells us something about how religion was understood when its human authors were alive.

In the theological spectrum that we find in the Christian Church, there will be plenty of advocates and detractors for each of those five ways of understanding inspiration. Where do you think you fit on that spectrum?

Likewise, there is also a range of ways in which passages of Scripture can be read and interpreted. Some Christians believe in a literal interpretation of the Bible (usually hand in hand with a Verbal Plenary understanding of inspiration). Other Christians believe that the underlying meaning being communicated (that is: "the truth") is more important than historical or scientific accuracy (that is: "the facts"). Many Christians hold a balance between these two views,

recognising that the Bible is a collection of texts which need to be read and interpreted in different ways depending on the type of writing: poetry, law, narrative (story-telling), prophecy, history, parables, epistles (letters), apocalyptic writing, wisdom literature, and genealogies. Attempting to read all of them literally, or all of them allegorically, can cause theological problems at both ends of the spectrum.

There are of course individuals and movements within the Christian Church who would seek to make their own way of understanding inspiration and interpretation the only way. And certainly there are many people who would denounce the beliefs of anyone who holds different beliefs to their own. Indeed, many Christian denominations and organisations have explicit statements of belief about the Bible to which all their members are bound. As Anglicans, though, we are not bound by many specific beliefs about the Bible. In our Articles of Religion, we have a simple statement which expresses our position: "Holy Scripture containeth all things necessary to salvation ..." (Article VI). This means that if you want to know about salvation (why we must be saved, and how we can be saved) then the answers are contained in the Bible. If anyone comes up with other ideas that cannot be proven from the Bible, then they should be rejected.

Have a think about your own understanding of inspiration and interpretation. Where did your views come from, and – whatever they might be - have you ever challenged them? The main thing, however, is this: No matter how we understand the Bible's origins or we interpret its words, God is inviting us to read it not just as ancient text, but as living witness through which he continues to speak to us, to challenge us, to comfort us, and to tell us about the supreme revelation of himself: his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.



Christmas is almost upon us once again. It is one of the most important days in the Church's calendar, when we celebrate the birth of our Saviour. More than ever it is becoming evident that we need to remember why he came and to give thanks to almighty God for this priceless gift.

This year some of our new members will be sharing Christmas with us for the first time. We know you must have precious memories of all your years in your home church. We hope your sense of loss will soften as time goes by and that you will feel truly at home here in St Peter's.

For others, Christmas can be a painful time. It is a time when the loss of someone dear to us can feel more stark, a time to be endured rather than celebrated. If you feel you can come to church over Christmas you will be sure of a warm welcome. We will have a Blue Christmas service at 10.30am on Wednesday 10th December which you might find helpful. If even that is too much we will keep you in our hearts and pray that God's love will surround you and give you his peace which passes all understanding.
